FOR STRICT REGULATION.

The proposed new liquor license ordinance prepared by special committees appointed by the city councils of Dallas, Independence and Falls City was read first time before the Dallas council at an adjourned meeting last night.

The ordinance is a lengthy document, but will be given to the county newspapers for publication next week, as the officials of the three towns desire it to be read by every voter in the county.

The object of the councils of the three incorporated towns in preparing this ordinance at this time is to let the voters know what regulations will be placed upon the liquor business in the event that the county shall vote wet in November. By preparing the ordinance now, strict regulations would be in force from the day that the vote went into effect. These officers say that the people have a right to know what they may expect from the city councils in the event that the county goes wet, and that this information should be given out before the vote is taken, so that every voter may vote intelligently.

The new ordinance is drawn along the identical lines of the ordinances in force in the cities of the United States where the liquor problem has been successfully solved, and where the evils resulting from the traffic have been reduced to the minimum. In preparing the measure, the committee had the advice and assistance of Sidney Storey, secretary of the National Model License League, an organization having for its object the strict control and regulation of the liquor business.

The ordinance contains numerous features that will be new and surprising to many people in Polk County, and we feel sure that it will be read with interest by every subscriber to the Observer. The measure will be published in full in next Tuesday's paper.

IN THE HANDS OF ITS FRIENDS.

The primaries are over. They were held September 24. Yet the Democratic campaign is going right ahead on the same old issues, the same old shoddy against the assembly, the same old appeal to the oppositionist factions and interests and warring elements within the party. But the war is over. This Bourne Democratic talk is all humbug, all buncombe. It doesn't sound true. Boasting the tom-tom and sounding the jangling cymbal gets tiresome when the Republican family has settled its differences and gone to bed.

Take that foolish story about the Legislature and Bowerman as Governor repeating Statement One. Is Statement One in danger? Then it will be betrayed in the hands of its friends, for the Legislature of 1911 will be a Statement One Legislature. A majority of Republican members have taken the Statement One pledge, and if any of them shall be defeated, their places will be taken by Democrats who are just as good Statement Oneers as any others.

The cry against Bowerman over the shoddy primary and Statement One is weak, childish and unwarranted. The Democrats and their Bourne familiars have lost their heads. Bowerman's record as to the primary law is good. His statement as to his present attitude is clear, frank and honest. He will do what he says and all he says. Everyone who knows Bowerman believes him and should believe him.—Oregonian.

The Solo News, a newspaper which fought every movement to create in-

terest in politics and get the voters to the polls, by arguing that no attempt should be made by parties or candidates to influence the will of the people, is now winning because so little was taken in the primary election. Why worry, brother? If it was the will of the people to remain at home, what business is it of your's if they didn't go to the polls?

Speaking of a union temperance rally held in Independence recently, the Independence Enterprise says Dr. H. C. Dunmore, pastor of the Presbyterian church referred to the "terrible examples of the evils of drunkenness among young men and mere boys" which he had witnessed in that town in the last month. "We have a prohibitory law in Independence," said Dr. Dunmore, "but it is broken every day, as we can plainly see with our own eyes." The Doctor says prohibition fails where the people do not want it, but declares that such people, and not prohibition, are to blame for the failure. This clergyman's view is precisely that of every thinking man who advocates high license and strict regulation as the best method of controlling the liquor evil. Doctor Dunmore is an ardent supporter of the cause of temperance, but he is too broad-minded and conciliatory to close his eyes to the wretched conditions so plainly apparent in his home town and county.

KILLED BY FALLING TREE

Gus Svant Meets Violent Death at Black Rock Logging Camp.

Gus Svant, a laborer in a Black Rock logging camp, was struck by a falling tree and fatally injured Tuesday afternoon. Svant was missed from camp late Tuesday afternoon. When he failed to appear at supper time, a number of his companions went out to look for him. They found him lying on the ground by a fallen tree, with a severe wound in his head and bleeding profusely. It was apparent that he had been struck by the falling tree. Doctor Hellworth was called from Falls City to attend him. He was placed on the train Wednesday morning and brought to Dallas, but died just as the train reached the station. The only known relative of the dead man is a brother living in Amsterdam, New York. The body is at Chapman's undertaking parlor and no arrangements will be made for burial until the brother can be heard from. Svant had been at the Luckiamute camp for several months. He was a good worker and was well liked by his fellow laborers.

The Woman's Missionary Society of the Evangelical Church held a jubilee meeting Wednesday afternoon at the home of the President, Mrs. Nellie I. Winter, in celebration of their Workers' Contest. Twenty-eight ladies of the church and guests were present. The afternoon was pleasantly spent in listening to a program of missionary songs, readings and papers. A business session was also held to arrange for the contest of next year. The Workers' Contest extends through a period of one year and is held for the purpose of stimulating interest in every form of missionary activity, both home and foreign. Mrs. Winter, the president, is much pleased with the progress made during the last year in securing new members and in arousing an active interest in the missionary work. The contest was prettily decorated with silver and gold ribbons, the colors of the society. The workers under the silver colors won the contest and gave the program, while the losing side served refreshments.

HAL PATTON STANDS FIRM

Repeats Assertions Made by Bourne Condemning Republican Party.

Hal D. Patton, of Salem, Statement No. 1 man and Republican nominee for the State Senate, holds to the statement which he recently made to the effect that he repudiates assertions made by Bourne condemning the assembly nominees of the Republican party. Patton was an anti-assembly man and continues to retain his ideas on that subject, but objects to any factionalism that might arise following the direct primary.

"I am not in any way in accord with the views of Jonathan Bourne, Jr., as expressed in the Portland Journal of September 28," says Patton. "At that time Bourne issued a statement through a Democratic party calling on Republican voters to support Democrats in the general election, rather than those men who were nominated at the primaries on an assembly platform. 'I believe in Republican principles and in the direct primary law,' continued Patton. 'I believe the place for Republicans to settle their differences is at the direct primary. I intend to support the ticket from top to bottom and shall abide by the decision of Republican voters as expressed by their vote on September 24. Any attempt to disrupt the party by endeavoring to throw Republican votes to Democrats I most heartily dislike.'"

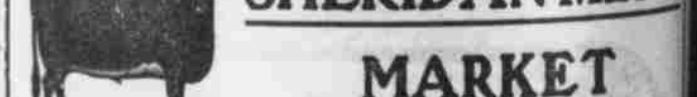
