

BOTH HOTELS ARE SOLD

N. A. Emmitt Buys Hotel Walker and Tavern in Falls City.

A business deal involving the neat sum of \$16,000 was consummated in Falls City this week when Nathan A. Emmitt purchased from Fred G. Meyer the Hotel Walker and the Tavern of that city. Mr. Emmitt took charge of the property at once.

By this purchase, Mr. Emmitt becomes the owner of both hotels in Falls City. The news that he had taken charge of these well known hotels caused great rejoicing among the business men and residents of the town, as Falls City had been greatly in need of better hotel accommodations.

Mr. Emmitt is now giving the Hotel Walker a thorough cleaning, and much new furniture will be added. The dining room service will be improved in every way and no pains will be spared to make the house attractive to the commercial trade.

The Tavern, formerly under the management of Hiram Fugitt, will be used as an annex to the Hotel Walker.

Sad News From Home.

GUILD ASKS FOR CLOTHING

Wide Variety of Garments Required to Meet Demands.

The following communication from the pen of Lillian Tingle, printed in the Sunday Oregonian, will prove of interest to every woman in Dallas, where the Needlework Guild of America has a large and enthusiastic membership.

Miss Tingle says:

"One of the most useful of unsectarian charitable organizations is the Needlework Guild of America, which is now beginning its annual task—the collection of new clothing and household linen for distribution not only among needy private cases, but also among the various charitable institutions of the city.

"More than 2000 garments were collected and distributed last year to those most in want of them; but the supply was by no means equal to the demand; 5000 garments would have been nearer the mark, and 10,000 not too many. In many instances after the contributed supply was exhausted, the officers of the guild provided at their own expense outfits for expectant mothers and pathetic tuberculosis patients.

"It is hoped that this year may be a banner year for the guild, since never before has the need been so great.

"It is an easy matter for man, woman, or child to become a member of this organization. There are no dues. All that is necessary to make or purchase, according to one's means, two new garments and send them to any of the ladies named. Do not wait to be asked personally. The comfortable glow of generosity is all the more comfortable when the generosity is voluntary and unexpected. The 'garments' may be anything—from baby socks to a suit of men's clothes, or from 5-cent towels to pairs of blankets. The only condition is that they must be new and must be in pairs. Remember this when you pass the tempting windows of the department store. If every one would help, even a little, an immense amount of suffering could be prevented during the coming winter."
