

NEW HOSPITAL IS OPENED

Occupies Large Residence of R. L. Chapman on Mill Street.

The Dallas Hospital now occupies the new quarters in the large residence of R. L. Chapman on Mill street. The building was moved last week and the hospital was opened again for patients Tuesday.

The new building is much more commodious than the old quarters in the Craven residence. The entire building has been re-papered and the wood work has been given a coat of white paint, giving the rooms a cheery and comfortable appearance.

Miss Agnes O'Keefe has purchased the equipment of the old hospital and will have the management of the new institution. She is a trained nurse of several years experience, and is thoroughly fitted for her work. Miss Elizabeth Schinner, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, is the assistant nurse and Mrs. Kate Muscott the housekeeper.

The hospital is one of Dallas most valuable institutions and the business men and residents of the city should give Miss O'Keefe all possible aid and encouragement.

STILL HANDS IT TO BOURNE

Bowerman Says Oregon Lost \$7,000,000 While Senator Played Golf.

Jay Bowerman, Republican nominee for Governor, addressed the people of Vale at the Courthouse, Monday night. The building was filled. Mr. Bowerman said:

"There are opponents to me in both parties. My main opponent in the Republican party is Jonathan Bourne, who made politics in Oregon damnable under his system of espionage, and who has been playing golf, poker and tending to his duties as your Senator. As Senator he allowed \$7,000,000 of Oregon's money to be taken from us while he played golf and otherwise employed himself.

"Look at the difference between Oregon and Idaho as you come along your border. Idaho has irrigation, fruit, alfalfa and grain, while Oregon is neglected and in a state of undeveloped just as it is 50 years ago. All this is the result of the neglect of our Senator at Washington.

"Mr. West claims I am supported by the railroads. West knows better than that. I was largely the cause of the enactment of the statute that made West's office as Railroad Commissioner possible, because when the two managers of the House and Senate were in conflict, I, as chairman of the committee on conference, got the two houses together.

Mr. Bowerman then explained that the object of Bourne in opposing him and favoring West was to keep the offices of the Penitentiary and other public institutions in a ring to campaign and work for him. Bowerman said he would force them to attend to their business, and would not let such men as the chief wardens of the Penitentiary go on two-and-three-week campaign trips to Portland and about the state at the state's expense, as he had been doing for Oswald West.

There was great enthusiasm. Oswald West had spoken just before, but his speech was one of platitudes. The business talk of Bowerman won over many Democrats in Malheur County.

A banquet was served at the hotel, and the band furnished music.
