

LEG BROKEN IN RUNAWAY

Mr. Ellis was hauling water when the runaway occurred. His wagon collided with a gatepost in the darkness and he was thrown to the ground between the two horses. The barrel on the wagon overturned and the splash of water frightened the horses and caused them to run. Both wagon wheels passed over Mr. Ellis' leg, breaking it twice just above the hip.

Mr. Minnich brought the unfortunate man to the Dallas Hospital today and the broken bones were set by Doctors McCall and Bollman.

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ENDOWMENT INCREASED

DALLAS COLLEGE WILL GET ANOTHER \$25,000 DONATION.

Dr. Poling and President Winter Are Successful in Their Work Before General Conference.

Dr. C. C. Poling, presiding elder of the United Evangelical Church, and The Reverend A. A. Winter, acting president of Dallas College, arrived home Sunday morning from Canton, Ohio, where they attended the General Conference of the United Evangelical Church as delegates from the Oregon Conference.

As a result of their efforts in behalf of Dallas College, the endowment of that school will soon be increased by the handsome sum of \$25,000. By showing to the conference that the college authorities had performed their allotted share of the work in increasing the endowment to \$25,000 from Oregon contributions to the fund, the General Conference, by a unanimous vote, opened the doors of the church in the Eastern States to the college, and the financial agents will now be permitted to solicit money from the membership of the large and wealthy churches.

Bishop R. Dubs, who has always been a loyal friend of Dallas College, and who donated \$1500 to the school a few years ago, made glad the hearts of the Oregon delegates when he arose in the General Conference session and announced that he would give \$1000 more. With this handsome contribution as a beginning, it will be an easy task to raise the remainder of the second installment of \$25,000, and it will not be long until the Dallas school will have the desired \$50,000 in its treasury. The generosity of Bishop Dubs is deeply appreciated by every friend of Dallas College. This donation of \$1500 is not the gift of a wealthy man, but represents the free-hearted offering of one who is willing to sacrifice many personal comforts in his declining years that the cause of education may be advanced by building up a strong and useful college in the Pacific Northwest.

Union of Churches Promoted.

Much of the time of the General Conference was devoted to consideration of the proposed consolidation of the United Evangelical Church, United Brethren Church and the Evangelical Association of America. Sentiment for

the union proved strong among the delegates, especially among the lay men, and a committee of 21 members was appointed to confer with like committees from the other two churches to determine the basis of the union. As it is known that the United Brethren and the Evangelical Association are anxious for the consolidation, it seems certain that the union will be effected in the near future. The consolidated church will have a membership of 300,000 in the United States. A union of the three churches would probably mean a merger of the United Evangelical College of Dallas and the United Brethren College of Philadelphia.

Dr. Poling and President Winter greatly enjoyed their long trip, which began September 8 and ended Sunday morning. They went East by way of Southern California, stopping at Los Angeles, Riverside, El Paso and other points of interest en route. Dr. Poling visited his aged mother in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, and also spent some time at the home of his son, Dan, in Columbus, Ohio. President Winter also enjoyed a brief vacation among friends and relatives in Pennsylvania.
