AN UPRIGHT JUDGE.

Judge George H. Burnett, of Salem, on the circuit bench in the third judicial district, is one of the best judges on the bench in Oregon. Since the primaries, when Judge Burnett was given the nomination for justice of the supreme court on the Republican ticket for the six-year term, he has been on the bench constantly and has paid no attention to the campaign, owing to the fact that his duties kept him busy. Judge Burnett has made an enviable record on the circuit bench in the third judicial district, composed of the counties of Marion, Linn, Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill, where he has served three terms of six years each, and in all that district he is very popular, especially with the farmers and business men, and at the primaries he was given over 300 more votes than were cast in that district for Chief Justice F. A. Moore, who, without opposition, was nominated for re-election, and is himself an extremely popular official.

Judge Burnett is a native of Yamhill county, and was educated in Oregon, working his way through school and college. He first came into public notice when he was elected district attorney for the third district, serving in that office from 1876 to 1878. From 1880 to 1892 he served as supreme court reporter, and he edited the supreme court reports, volumes 29, 31, and 32. Among his neighbors Judge Burnett is very popular. In all matters affecting his home, city, county and state, he is in the forefront when celebrations of a public nature are to be held, and his advice is earnestly and eagerly sought for in matters of this kind. Of the strictest integrity and a scrupulously clean life, he has the highest regard of all who know him and all classes are proud to do him honor and to call him their friend.

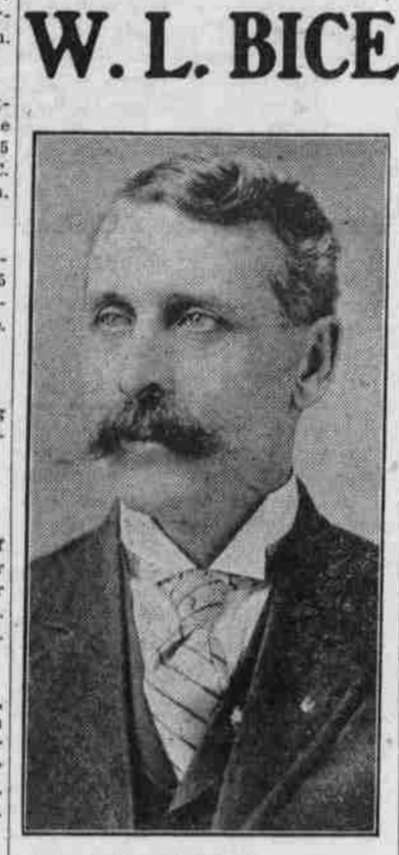
