MRS. SANFORD BUTLER DIES

Came to Polk County from Illinois in the Year 1853.

Mrs. Elizabeth Butler one of Polk County's good old pioneer mothers, passed to her reward at the home of her son, John Butler, near Williamsburg, Thursday, October 20, 1910, aged 81 years. She had been an invalid for many years and had been totally blind for the last ten years.

Mrs. Butler, whose maiden name was Nelson, was the widow of the late Sanford Butler, of Salt Creek. She was born in Illinois in 1829 and came to Oregon in 1853. Mr. Butler died about 15 years ago. She is survived by five children.

The funeral was preached by the Reverend Barton Z. Riggs, Friday, and burial took place in the Salt Creek cemetery.

New Divorce Case Filed.

Mrs. Jessie P. Glover has instituted divorce proceedings against her husband, George E. Glover. In her complaint she makes the usual charges of cruel treatment and asks the future custody of the two daughters aged 6 and 9 years respectively.
