STATE ATTORNEY'S OPINION

Says Home Rule Will Be Subject to Local Option Law.

Passage of the home rule amendment to the Constitution at the November election will not, as opponents of the measure have contended, make the State Constitution and criminal laws inoperative in cities and towns of Oregon, according to the official opinion of Attorney General Crawford.

When he learned that this question had been raised, H. C. McAllister, general manager of the Oregon Home Rule Association, requested the attorney general for an opinion. The following ruling was made:

H. C. McAllister, Portland, Oregon: Dear Sir: Referring to yours of the 24th inst., requesting opinion of this office as to whether the proposed constitutional amendment of section 2 of article XI of the constitution of the State of Oregon, should it become a law, would have the effect of exempting cities and towns from the operation of the constitution and criminal laws of the state of Oregon, I beg to say that such amendment would not have that effect.

It provides that the legal voters of every city and town are hereby granted power to enact and amend their municipal charters subject to the constitution and criminal laws of the State of Oregon, and the exclusive power to license, regulate, control, or to suppress or prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors therein is vested in such municipality, but such municipality shall within its limits be subject to the provisions of the local option law of the State of Oregon.

That amendment vests the legal voters of every city or town with authority to amend their charters in any manner which does not violate the provisions of the constitution of the state or the criminal laws of the state. Then it vests in the city council, or in the people through the city council, the exclusive power to control and regulate, or prohibit, the sale of intoxicating liquors within the corporate limits, but at the same time it gives the people of the municipality the right to vote local option within the municipality at any time they please, and when the legal voters of the incorporation shall vote local option, then the power of the city council to grant licenses is suspended during the time that prohibition is in force within the city.
