

APPOINTED NORMAL REGENT

W. C. Bryant Succeeds E. E. Bragg on State Board.

Professor William Cullen Bryant, of Moro, has been appointed by Acting Governor Bowerman as a member of the State Board of Normal Regents, to succeed E. E. Bragg, whose term expired June 30, 1918. Mr. Bragg is a resident of La Grande.

The new appointee will remain in office until June 30, 1919. Professor Bryant is County School Superintendent of Sherman County and an attorney of Moro. He is a graduate of the Monmouth Normal School and of the University of Oregon.

The Board of Normal Regents is considered to be one of the important bodies now that the Monmouth Normal School is given a new lease of life. Under the initiative measure which re-established that school as subject to state maintenance, there will be large sums of money placed at the disposal of the board annually for the care of the school and probably for additional buildings, this being the only normal school now coming under state supervision.

Professor Bryant, the newly appointed regent, is a Republican.

Proposals for Wood for State Institutions.
The boards of trustees of the several state institutions located at or near the city of Salem, intend to receive bids for wood for the year 1911, as follows:
Insane Asylum—5000 cords "first growth" fir at main building; also bids on second growth fir, 1000 cords first growth fir at Asylum Farm; also bids on second growth fir.
Penitentiary—300 cords first growth fir, 600 cords second growth fir and 100 cords grub oak.
Reformatory—25 cords second growth fir and 25 cords grub oak.
Capital Building—500 cords "first growth" fir; also bids on second growth fir.
Deaf Mute School—550 cords of first growth fir; also bids on second growth fir.
Blind School—Consult Superintendent E. T. Moore relative to amount of wood desired and time set for receiving bids.
State Institution for Feeble Minded—Consult Superintendent H. E. Bickers relative to amount of wood desired and time set for receiving bids.
Tuberculosis Sanatorium—Consult Superintendent H. J. Clements relative to amount of wood desired and time set for receiving bids.
Switch connections with the Southern Pacific Company enable bidders to deliver wood in carload lots at the Oregon State Insane Asylum and Penitentiary.
Bids will be received for all or any part of the above. Cord wood must be cut while green, from sound timber, four feet long, reasonably straight, well seasoned, delivered as designated at or near the places designated, closely corded without bulkheads.
Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check, payable to the undersigned, in the sum of 25 cents per cord, to be forfeited to the state as damages in case the bidder receiving the award shall fail to execute a contract to furnish a cord and deliver the wood. Do not enclose bids in envelope containing bid for nothing but certified checks will be accepted. Successful bidders will be required within ten days after notification of acceptance of bid to enter into a contract and furnish a satisfactory bond. Bidders should be careful to state in their bids the name of the institution and the kind and number of cords to be furnished. Bids of the institution and the kind and number of cords to be furnished. Bids must be sealed in envelopes endorsed "Proposals for wood," and addressed to the undersigned.
