HARD PAVEMENT.

Dallas made a grave mistake when
it improved its business streets with
crushed rock. The Observer fought
the plan as hard as it could, arguing
that macadam was at best a poor sub-
stitute for smooth-surfaced pavement;
that it would soon wear out in the
business district; that property-owners
could not afford to spend large sums
of money for this inferior improve-
ment when permanent, hard surface
streets could be built for only a few
dollars more. This newspaper pointed
out that, under the bonding act, any
property-owner not desiring to pay all
of his assessment at one time could
have his payments distributed through-
out a period of ten years, thus giving him
an opportunity to greatly increase the
value of his real estate without feeling
the expense.

The Observer was right then, and it
is right now, when it says that the
streets should be paved without further
delay. Dallas will never grow as it
ought to grow, and is entitled to
grow as long as it has filthy, ill-
looking streets. Argue as he may, no
one can get away from this fact. No
town ever begins to make real growth
until it paves its streets. Every live
town in the Willamette Valley except
Dallas has either paved or is prepar-
ing to pave. Every town that has
paved is making a more rapid growth
than Dallas is making. We cannot
afford to fall behind in the race. We
must not.

There should be neither criticism nor
blame for the city officers who have
built our macadam streets. They did
what they thought was best. But to
pursue this mistaken policy of street
improvement would be nothing less
than a criminal waste of the people's
money. Let's get right and build up
Dallas. Let the slogan be "Hard pave-
ment for the business streets and
macadam for the residence district!"

To Publisher C. D. Babcock belongs
the honor of lending the most elaborate
Christmas newspaper produced in a
country printing office in Oregon this
year. The holiday number of the Sta-
tion Mail contains 24 pages of carefully
written and entertaining descriptive
matter and neatly displayed advertise-
ments of Station business firms. Mr.
Babcock's field is small, but the sup-
port received from the merchants of
his town is making it possible for him
to publish a newspaper that would be
a credit to a city of several thousand
inhabitants. In return, the Mail is
giving Station a definite place on the
map of Oregon.

THE MILLONAIRES BOSS.

The idea that the citizens of Oregon
are to be "educated" in the exercise
of the franchise by the use of money con-
tributed for that purpose by a Phila-
delphia soap maker and turned over
to an Oregon City lawyer for expendi-
ture, seems to be the most ridiculous
political proposition ever presented.
The old-time political boss has "lost
out," apparently, but the new boss ap-
pears to be no better than the old one,
except that he claims the more respec-
table title of "teacher," and frank-
ly admits that he "gets the money."—
Falls City News.

PRACTICAL SUGGESTION.

The most practical suggestion yet
made for the betterment of the Ore-
gon registration law is that of Clerk
Fields, of Multnomah County, who is
preparing a bill which will go before
the next session of the legislature in
January. The important feature of
Clerk Fields' measure is that a voter
once registered will not be required to
register again, provided he does not
move out of the precinct or does not
fail to vote at two succeeding elections.
It is proposed to leave the books
open for registration throughout the
year except for 15 days prece-
ding a primary or general election.
These changes would avoid the usual
rush for registration in election years
as the great body of voters would re-
main on the books until they died or
moved away. New voters and those
who move from one precinct to an-
other could register at any time.

In place of the clumsy registration
records, Clerk Fields suggests the use
of a card index system. Such cards
could be filled out easily and quickly
and would be much handier for elec-
tion officers than the duplicate sets of
books now in use. Mr. Fields adopted
the card index system in his office sev-
eral years ago as an adjunct to the
books. He says without their aid the
work of registration in Multnomah
County would now be an almost im-
possible task.

To meet the objection that by fail-
ing to require a new general registra-
tion every two years the register will
be unencumbered by names of dead men
and those who have moved away, Mr.
Fields' bill provides that when a man
fails to vote at two succeeding general
elections his name shall be dropped.
It is furthermore made the duty of the
county clerk to remove at once from the
list the names of all those whose
death is disclosed by the official mar-
riage records or the records of the
probate court.

In addition to the simplicity of this
system, it is claimed that its adoption
would mean a saving of thousands of
dollars in each county every two years.
Not only would the expense of addi-
tional clerk hire be eliminated, but
others would be saved the expense of
visiting the courthouse every two years
to register.

An improved registration law is
badly needed in Oregon, and as Clerk
Fields' bill seems to be the most prac-

tical and economical plan of solution
yet offered, it is hoped that the leg-
islature will give his suggestions the
most careful consideration.

HOPS REACH 16 1-2 CENTS

Many Growers Are Holding Firmly
For 20-Cent Market.

Hops have reached 16 1/2¢ a pound,
and the outlook seems bright for still
higher prices. Frank Durbin at Salem
purchased 140 bales from Kola Neis
at the high market, this being an ad-
vance of 1/2¢ paid by Herman Kluber
for the Percival lot Thursday.

The market for hops is extremely
firm, and purchases are hard to make
because growers are insisting upon 20¢
for their holdings. The east is offering
plenty of business, but most orders
are for 16¢, and no transactions can be
closed now at this figure.

So few bales of hops remain unsold
in the hands of either producers or
dealers that large purchases cannot
be made in the future. With less than
2000 bales remaining in the hands of
growers, and these scattered among
many, the future outlook is for drib-
bling transactions.

Outside markets are firm, but quiet,
owing to the lack of offerings.
