

INVENTED IN PORTLAND

Combined Cash Register and Change Maker to Be Marketed.

W. W. King and G. P. Newmeyer have lately arrived in Dallas, where they expect to remain some time in the interests of the United States Cashier Company, a corporation newly organized in Portland for the purpose of manufacturing a combined cash register and change maker. This invention is the result of long and laborious work on the part of two Portland mechanical geniuses, who, although working independently and at practically the same state of perfection. The machine is a very remarkable piece of mechanism, which from all indications, will revolutionize the present systems and methods of counting money, making change, and registering every transaction, together with the totals for any specified period, day, week, month or year. It has been tried out before the majority of the leading business houses of Portland, and in every case it has astonished and delighted all by its marvelous and ingenious operations.

Wherever it has been shown it has received hearty endorsement, and Mr. King and Mr. Newmeyer have a large number of testimonials from firms and names are well known in the Northwest. Among others who speak highly of the new automatic cash register are the Manufacturers' Association of the Northwest, German-American Bank, City Treasurer, Chief Paymaster United States Army (Department of the Columbia), Merchants' National Bank, Portland Chamber of Commerce, Ladd & Tilton Bank, and Olds, Wortman and King, all of Portland. Mr. Newmeyer and Mr. King will endeavor to induce Dallas investors to look into the new enterprise.
