The answer is easy. Oregon's most interesting object is W. S. U. Ren.

In these popular days, when we are all lawmakers and constitution carpenters, a legislative session represents a useless waste of time, energy and money. Oregon does not need a law-making body which meets only once in two years when it has a law factory at Oregon City in operation the year round.

The Observer welcomes such communications from the farmers and fruit raisers of the county.

Without a single exception, the merchants of Dallas report the January trade to be the liveliest in years. Buying by old customers is much heavier than usual, and the number of new faces among the crowds is distinctly noticeable. While much of this trade is attracted by the well-written and prominently displayed clearance sale advertisements, the fact remains that the business of Polk County is steadily growing and the demand for merchandise of all kinds is rapidly increasing. The outlook for a busy and prosperous year was never brighter in Oregon, and Dallas, with her large and well-stocked stores and obliging merchants, will have a liberal and well-deserved share in the general prosperity.

The Statesman suggests to the merchants of Salem that by leaving the lights burning in their show windows a few hours at night, the streets of the capital city would present more of a "city" appearance. The editor cites Eugene as a fine example of a brilliantly lighted and attractive town. In Eugene the merchants leave their window lights burning until along toward midnight, thus helping to light the city and give late travelers an opportunity to view the displays. The Statesman's suggestion to the merchants of Salem is timely and might be heeded with profit by the business men of every town in the Willamette Valley. Every business house in Dallas should leave at least a few lights burning each night, especially in the early evening hours. Dark stores and shops are not a good advertisement of a live town.

Polk Sheep Best. Oregon bred and reared Cotswold sheep entered at the winter sheep show of the National Wool Growers' convention, just drawing to a close in this city, by Fred A. Kooser, of Hickory, Polk County, are declared winners against the prize winners at the Royal Sheep show of Great Britain. The other celebrated long wool sheep in the Lincoln. Out of 23 awards, 11 firsts and three seconds went to Hawley & Sons, of McCoy, in the Willamette Valley, while 1 first, 2 seconds and 2 thirds went to Riddell & Sons, of Monmouth, in the Willamette Valley. John H. Stump, also of Monmouth, received three awards in the various classes, and this against the best exhibits that Wisconsin and Idaho could show.

It is to be noted, by those fearful that the farm is losing its attractions for the growing generation, that the sons of Hawley and the sons of Riddell share the honors of their fathers and carry on their traditions. The owner of the prize winners at the English show, admitting his defeat, lays its cause largely to the credit of soil, climate, and conditions in the Willamette valley. ASK MORE TARIFF ON MOHAIR

Goat Breeders of Northwest Elect Officers and Adjourn.

Higher protection for the mohair industry than was provided for in the present tariff was urged in a resolution passed at the concluding session of the convention of the Northwest Angora Goat Association in the Imperial Hotel Saturday forenoon, says the Oregonian. Allegiance to the American system of protection was affirmed and it was specially urged that schedule K be not altered so as to reduce duties. The resolutions declared, with reference to schedule K:

"We recognize that every time departure has been made from the principles therein contained serious disaster has befallen the industry of mohair growing, but as applied to mohair we believe there should be a higher tariff on the raw material."

The following was also unanimously adopted: "In view of the fact that the Oregon State Fair has the best livestock exhibit of any fair in the West and that more admirers and prospective purchasers of goats attend this fair than any other fair, therefore be it

"Resolved, That the members of this association do all in their power to make the fair of 1911 the best ever held."

That interest in the Angora goat industry was growing was the tenor of an address by Alva L. McDonald, secretary of the association. Mr. McDonald said that the Angora industry had furnished a partial solution of the longed-for land question, as goats were able to obtain nutriment from the plants and grasses which grow on such lands.

"More than 50 firms started into Angora goat raising last year," said Mr. McDonald. "Inquiries relative to the industry have reached me from every section of the Northwest and California." Other speakers at Saturday's session were: G. W. McElwee, of Dallas, Or.; U. S. Grant, of Dallas, Or.; and John W. Fulton, of Helena, Mont. Mr. Fulton discussed registered Angoras, urging goat men to improve their flocks. Officers were elected as follows: President, E. H. Rhoten, of Salem, Or.; vice-president, E. L. Naylor, of Forest Grove, Or.; secretary and treasurer, Alva L. McDonald, of Portland; directors, G. W. McElwee, of Dallas, Or.; C. B. Chin, of Oakland, Or.; and W. C. Harkness, of Reno, Idaho.

BOTH FALLS CITY TEAMS WIN

Salem and Corvallis Are Defeated by Polk County Debutants.

FALLS CITY, Or., Jan. 7.—The debutants of the high school teams of Falls City and Salem last night, before a large audience here, was won by the Falls City team, consisting of Miss Ruel, leader, Miss Seymour and Mr. Gottfried. The Salem team consisted of Mr. Smith, leader, Miss Outback, and Mr. Linkins. The question debated was, "Resolved, That immigration should be further restricted by an educational test." W. A. West of Salem, D. M. Metzger of Dallas, and A. G. Barnhart, of Dallas, were judges. At the same time the Falls City second high school team, consisting of the Toose twins and Miss Martin, won the debate with the big school at Corvallis, at the latter place. The Falls City high school is under the charge of Principal J. E. Dunton.

COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL FUND

County Court Levies One-Half Mill Tax For Their Support.

The County Commissioners' Court convened again yesterday morning, and will probably be in session the greater part of the week. Much work awaits the court at this session in the way of settling with retiring road supervisors, appointing new supervisors, fixing the tax levy and drawing the jury list.

At the session this morning the court found that it would be necessary to levy a tax of one-half mill to raise the County High School fund voted at the November election. This fund will be apportioned as follows:

Toose were listened to with appreciative attention, as was that of State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. R. One teacher present declared, at the close of the meeting, that he had attended two three-day institutes at other points in this State, and that he had received more benefit in one day at Falls City than at both the others.

The next County Institute will be held at Independence, Saturday, February 4. In addition to other speakers whom Superintendent Seymour will secure for the occasion, W. Livingston will be there and will take up the subject of "Pronouns," and will also address the teachers upon "Reading to Learn."
