Curtis G. Rowell, whose death occurred at the home of his son-in-law, Postmaster C. G. Coad, last Thursday, was born near Columbus, Ohio, March 2, 1833. At an early age he moved to Iowa, where, in 1854, he married Miss Elizabeth Black in the city of Decatur.

Mr. and Mrs. Rowell crossed the plains to Walla Walla, Wash., in 1861, and three years later came to Oregon. They lived in McMinnville for a short time and then moved to Sheridan, where Mr. Rowell followed the occupation of blacksmithing for three years. Thirty-three years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Rowell moved to Dallas, and both resided here the remainder of their lives. Mrs. Rowell passed away about 15 years ago.

Mr. Rowell followed blacksmithing all of his life, with the exception of a few years when he was engaged in the sawmill business. He conducted a small mill on Teal Creek for a time, and afterward moved his plant to a point on the bank of the Luckiamute river where the town of Falls City now stands.

Mr. Rowell is survived by three sons, Thomas Rowell of Eastern Washington, Frank Rowell of Dallas, and William W. Rowell of Rickreall, and by three daughters, Mrs. A. V. R. Snyder of Salem, Mrs. C. G. Coad, and Mrs. V. P. Pike of Dallas.

"Uncle Curt" was a kind and generous man and was highly esteemed by his neighbors. His business career was honorable and he was ever ready to aid those less fortunately situated than himself. He was a companionable man, and in his later years, when overtaken by partial deafness, he greatly missed the congenial and comforting conversation of his friends.

These declining years he spent in reading the newspapers, thus keeping in touch with current events. He was also an earnest student of the Bible and the works of the best modern writers. Uncle Curt was one of the best-known pioneers of Polk County, and his many friends will miss him.
