HOME OF FANCY STOCK.

The extent to which Polk County has advanced in the breeding of thoroughbred livestock of all kinds is not fully realized by even her own residents. Very few are aware of the comparative position this county holds in that respect. The increase in quality and quantity of pedigree animals has progressed so quickly that it was taken as a matter of course, and little has been thought, and still less said, about it. Consequently, it is interesting to note that Polk is the home of more high grade, pure-bred stock than any other county in Oregon. Furthermore, a computation based on the pages of an agricultural paper, containing the advertisement of every leading livestock farm in the state, shows that the breeders of Polk County comprise about 32 per cent of the whole number in Oregon.

The fine stock thus included within the borders of the county, ranks highly among the best of its kind in the Nation, and many of them are superior to those raised elsewhere, as has been proven more than once in competition. The local breeders who have brought about this condition are almost without exception very progressive and modern in their methods and ideas, so that they are constantly seeking means to still further improve the merits of their herds and flocks. The mere fact that an animal was registered did not, in their eyes, place it on so high a plane that it could not be improved. Registration, of itself, was not the object sought, but simply the means to an end. They have realized the value of strains and of line and specialty breeding, and have taken advantage of the opportunities to improve the quality where it has been possible. The results have spoken for themselves, and now in many a comfortable farm home, nestled in the valleys of old Polk, or sheltered by the spreading oaks along her hillside, there rest priceless trophies of the competition, not alone with the United States, but with the world. Hence it is that the title, "The Blue Ribbon County," has not been bestowed here without just cause.

Of the various kinds of thoroughbred stock raised here, there are perhaps more Jerseys than any other, but the list is a long one, and includes Berkshires, Poland Chinas, and other breeds of swine; Holstein-Friesian cattle; Cotswold, Lincoln, and other kinds of sheep; and the Angora goats that Polk County breeders have made famous. These are only a part of the different kinds bred, and gave only a small idea of the varieties and numbers. Many features of climate and location help to make this county an ideal location for the rearing of stock, and the business is destined to grow until it will become the Mecca of the stock fanciers from everywhere. Thousands of acres of choice land especially adapted to the business are still available, and the title of "The Blue Ribbon County" will continue to be maintained.

As there is no available list of the names of the breeders, or of the kinds of stock bred in Polk County, the Observer wishes to compile and publish in its columns a complete directory giving such information in full. Therefore it will be glad to receive from every breeder of fine stock in the county a statement giving his name and address, the name of his farm, and kinds of stock he breeds, together with a list of the premiums they have won. Everyone who breeds thoroughbred stock of any kind, from chickens up, should respond to this request, and urge his neighboring breeders to do likewise. Do not delay, but send in the information to the Observer at once.

FREIGHT RATES RETROACTIVE

Railroad Company to Refund Difference Between Old and New Rates.

Following upon the heels of the announcement that the Southern Pacific Railroad Company had adopted a lower schedule of freight rates, which went into effect last Wednesday morning, comes the information that the company will voluntarily refund to all shippers the difference between the old rates and the new, on goods shipped between October 13, 1910, and February 8, 1911. The order for a reduction of rates was made by the State Railroad Commission on the former date, but the matter has been held up by an injunction which the company had served on the commission. Now, however, the railroad company has concluded to obey the order, and to make its rates retroactive. The difference in charges which will be paid back to shippers, as a result of the order, will aggregate practically \$40,000.

Any one who has shipped freight at the old rates during the period just mentioned is entitled to receive the difference in return, and a claim therefor should be made. The claims will be handled direct from the company's office in Portland, and all communications on the subject should be addressed to James Copland, freight claim agent, Portland. Claims should not be sent to the local station agents, as it will only result in delay and cause them unnecessary work.

In hundred pound lots, Portland to Dallas, the new rates are: First class, 27 cents; second, 24; third, 19; fourth, 17. For carload lots, the new rates are as follows, per hundred: Class 1, 15 cents; A, 13; B, 12; C, 11; D, 8; E, 7; the reduction ranging from 1 to 3 cents, according to class.

These rates apply from the Park Street depot in Portland, as well as from the Jefferson Street depot, whereas, under the old rates, an additional charge was added to shipments originating at Park street.

Monmouth Wins Again.

At Monmouth, in one of the most exciting games of the season, the Monmouth High School lads defeated the champion High School team of Silverton, by a score of 24 to 12. A large crowd assembled to witness the game, and after the first five minutes there was no question as to Monmouth's superiority for victory. The steady floor work, passing, and accurate basket-shooting of the latter team won with ease, and the visitors were shut out with only three field goals and six fouls.

FOR BETTER LIGHTING

OREGON POWER COMPANY OFFERS MODERN SYSTEM.

Merchants' Protective Association Takes Further Steps Towards Organizing Commercial Club.

Whether the main business part of Dallas shall remain in comparative darkness at night, or whether it shall blossom forth with an improved, modern system of sidewalk lighting, is a question that is now being discussed by the Merchants' Protective Association, held Monday evening, J. L. White, of the Oregon Power Company's plant in this city, made an offer to provide the block on Main street, between Mill and Court, with the new cluster system of lighting, and in order to introduce it here he will make a reduction in price below that charged elsewhere. His plan provides for four iron posts on each block, one on each corner and two at intermediate distances between. Each post will be surmounted by three tungsten cluster lamps, making a total of 270 candle power, or 1080 to the block. After the posts are installed, the cost of maintenance will be about \$1 per month for each merchant on the block.

More Light Needed. The same proposition will be made to the County Court for the purpose of having a like number of lights placed along the west side of the Court House square, and one each on the north and south sides in the middle of the block. The proposition seems to meet with considerable favor on the part, as the present lack of light along the main business street is deplorable, and the need for a change is plainly evident. A cluster of lights of the same power as those suggested is now in use by the Oregon Power Company's Main street, between Church and Main, and is the same as those adopted in Portland.

Want Booster Club. The formation of a Commercial Club was given further consideration by the Association, and in order to start the ball rolling, a committee, consisting of W. L. Soehren, Frank Kerslake and J. R. Craven, was appointed to formulate plans for its organization. Considerable interest is manifested in the prospect of a club, and once the preliminary details are worked out, the boosters will follow quickly. The Association adopted the report of the committee recommending the levying of an occupation tax on the business and professional men of the city, for the purpose of raising funds to pay for a night watchman and for sprinkling the streets during the dry months, and the city council will be signified their intention to be present.

Building Big Hotel. Oscar Holmes, of Dallas, who has charge of the construction work on the new Abbey Hotel, arrived Saturday with a party of carpenters, and began the building work, which has been delayed by the slow progress made under adverse weather conditions in putting in the basement and stone wall foundations. From this on the work will be rushed as fast as possible. Lumber and other material arrived Saturday and no further delays are anticipated.—Newport News-Reporter.

Geese Overlooked. SALEM, Or., Feb. 10.—Protection of honker or Canadian geese, in reality the native Oregon goose, is provided in a bill which passed the Senate today. It was introduced by Senator Herrymann. He explained that at the last session, when the game laws were amended, the native geese were inadvertently overlooked and have been unprotected for the last two years.
