

DISPOSITION OF BILLS

ACTION TAKEN BY GOVERNOR WEST ON LEGISLATIVE BILLS

List of Those Which Survived Executive Veto, and Will Become Laws

Bills passed by the recent State Legislature have been disposed of as follows. A number of other measures remain to be acted upon by the Governor, so that a complete list of the new laws will not be available for a week or so yet. LEGISLATIVE RESUME

APPROPRIATIONS AMOUNT TO \$5,100,000—\$7.43 PER CAPITA

Brief Mention of Principal Bills Passed by State Solons at Salem

After having introduced 725 bills, and after appropriating about \$5,100,000, or a fraction over \$7.43 for every man, woman and child in the state, the Oregon Legislature adjourned Saturday night, and hiked up the back seat of his home, and explanations as to how it happened are now being prayerfully prepared.

Several of the most important measures passed by the two houses are still in the hands of Governor West and whether or not they become laws depends on the exercise of his veto power. The Governor has five days from the time the bills are delivered to him to consider and pass on them, so it will not be until late in the week that the fate of some measures will be finally determined.

Principal Bills Reviewed. The enactments of the session were the good roads law, extension of the powers of the Railroad Commission and the public utility corporations, second choice in primary nominations, placing the State Printer on a flat salary, providing a state purchasing board, prohibiting a salaried state officer from furnishing supplies to the state, creating the office of Assistant Secretary of State, providing a method for creating new counties, and appropriating \$20,000 to be disbursed by a state immigration agent in exploiting officially the resources of the state.

Provision has been made for a commission to revise the judicial system of the state and to recommend such subjects of legislation "to the 1913 legislative session as may be deemed necessary, says a correspondent of the Oregonian.

Another commission will confer with the State Board of Tax Commissioners and submit to the next Legislature necessary legislation on the subject of taxation.

Salary Increases Proposed. The Legislature has introduced a bill creating the office of County Attorney in the several counties, abolishing the office of District Attorney. At the same time another bill was passed increasing the salaries of the Circuit Judges of the state from \$2000 to \$4000 per annum. A general revision of the insurance and irrigation codes of the state was made, and the efficiency of these important departments in the state government promoted thereby.

A comprehensive law for the licensing and regulating of automobiles received the approval of both houses, and is before the Governor.

The state banking law has been amended in many important respects, guaranteeing to depositors greater protection. Among other important changes in this law is the provision by which all private banks shall be examined by experienced bank examiners under the direction of the Superintendent of Banks at least twice annually. The only bill to be forced through the Legislature over the veto of Governor West was that of the chairman of Douglas, abolishing the whipping post.

Election Laws Amended. Aside from the passage of Speaker Rusk's bill, requiring electors to designate their second choice in primary nominating elections, for every office for which there are more than two candidates, the Legislature amended the election laws of the state where they will remain for a few months—Salem Statesman.
