SHOWS PAVEMENT SAMPLES

Asphaltum Macadam Has Material For Surfacing Canyon Streets.

The Universal Construction Company, of Portland, through Fred R. Waters, its representative, is showing samples of the El Oro Asphaltic pavement in Dallas today.

The company offers to repave or surface streets already under macadam with this hard-surface asphalt at a cost of about \$1.50 a square yard—a price considerably lower than that of other hard-surface pavements.

Those who have examined the sample of pavement shown here pronounce it to be of first-class quality.

Mr. Waters would like to interest the property owners in this new pavement, fully guaranteeing it in every particular, and assuring that it is cheaper to the property owner by about one-half than the ordinary pavement.

DALLAS MERCHANT DIES

B. M. GUY, PROMINENT 'CITIZEN,' SUCCEEDS TO INJURIES.

Actively Connected With Business and Social Life of City and County.

B. M. Guy, one of Dallas' best known and most prominent young business men, died at his home in this city, early Friday morning, February 24, of softening of the brain, resulting from a spinal injury received while at work in Newberg last November.

For a number of weeks past his condition had been most alarming, but still each change was hoped to be for the better, and every transition in his illness was anxiously watched by his relatives and many friends.

It was the most common topic of conversation on the street and among the places of business, and the latest report as to his progress was eagerly sought and tenderly discussed, for he had spent his lifetime here, and as boy and man had made many friends in the commercial and social life of the city and county.

He was born near Dallas, July 4, 1879, and was accordingly aged 41 years, 7 months and 20 days. He attended LaCrosse Academy, and was a graduate of that institution in the class of 1900. September 4, 1907, he was married to Miss Mabel M. Holmes, of Dallas.

Prominent in City Life.

He became a member of the hardware firm of Guy Brothers November 7, 1902, and since that time had been actively engaged in the commercial life of the city, and became identified with its leading fraternal and social societies.

He was a member of Friendship Lodge, No. 6, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, of which he was Past Grand, and had been representative to the Grand Lodge. He was also a member of Alhira Lodge of Rebekahs, No. 26, of Dallas, and of Dallas Camp No. 209, Women of the World; and also of Mattotie Circle, Women of Woodcraft.

He was vice-president of the Dallas Merchants' Protective Association, and much of the success of that organization is due to his enterprise and sagacity. He had also served with the Dallas Volunteer Fire department, and at the time of his death was an expert fireman.

As a member of Company H, Oregon National Guard, located in this city, he took a keen interest in military affairs, which won for him the rank of corporal, and about two months before he passed away he was recommended for promotion to the position of sergeant, but owing to the formality of the military authorities, the commission had not yet arrived.

Surviving Relatives.

Mr. Guy is survived by his wife and two-year old daughter, Cleo, and by his mother, Mrs. M. J. Guy, of Dallas; his sister, Mrs. William Ellis, of Falls City; and his brothers, N. L. Guy, Charles Guy, John Guy and Thomas Guy, of Dallas.

The funeral was conducted at the Methodist Episcopal Church, Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, under the auspices of Friendship Lodge of Odd Fellows. The sermon was delivered by the Reverend George F. Hopkins, pastor of the church. His subject was "Life's Brevity," the scriptural reference being taken from Psalm 103:15-16.

An immense throng of sorrowing friends filled the church and overflowed the entrance. In respect to his memory, all of the business houses and mills of Dallas remained closed from 1:30 to 3:00 p. m.

The pallbearers were Edwin Jacobson, H. A. Webster, G. C. Burch, T. G. Richmond, George L. Hawkins, and Charles Gregory.
