

WITHOUT LOSS OF LIFE

HARRIMAN LINES CARRY 49,491,000 PERSONS IN SAFETY.

Report for 1910 Received by Local Agents Shows No Fatalities—Anti-Accident Crusade Effective.

Installation of safety devices and the block signal system are cited for the record of the Harriman railroads in carrying 49,491,000 passengers in 1910 without sacrificing a single life.

The report was compiled in the office of Julius Kruttschnitt, director of maintenance and operation, Chicago. It covers the business of the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific and affiliated roads, a total of 17,960 miles. The total number of passengers carried on a mile basis is 2,600,000,000.

Remarkable Record.

The Harriman system carried 10 per cent of the estimated 1910 passenger traffic. The figures for most of the other railroads have not yet been compiled by the government, but in 1909 the number of passengers carried was 29,000,000,000. The figures for 1910, it is said, will not exceed a billion more.

Many other railroads have gone through a year without a fatality to any of its passengers, but it is said that no system has made this record for such a large total of passengers.

Result of System.

Results on the Harriman lines are ascribed to a campaign waged by the management for years to reduce accidents. The Harriman system now has more miles of automatic block signal protection than any other system in the world. Mr. Kruttschnitt has directed special attention to the accident problem, and began several years ago to bring about a reduction by giving complete publicity to all forms of accidents and their investigation, which, it is believed, spurred officers and employees to greater efforts to safeguard lives.

In 1903-1904 the number of accidents on the Union Pacific was 20 for 1,000,000 locomotive miles. On the Pacific system of the Southern Pacific the number of accidents per 1,000,000 locomotive miles was reduced from 29.5 to 19.5 in the same time.

SHAKING STATE PLUM TREE

Aspirants Bobbing Up For Possible Paying Positions.

Among those who are trying to succeed Superintendent C. W. James, as head of the state penitentiary, should that position be available, is John S. Smith, of Airline, if the statement of the Salem correspondent of the Oregonian may be accepted as authority on the subject.

Like moths around a candle aspirants are fluttering about the superintendency of the state penitentiary, which is considered one of the most tempting plum Governor West has to offer. The Governor is firm in his assertion that there is not apt to be a change at the institution.

Applications from many parts of the state have found their way to the Governor's office. One of the most active is August Hockstein, a Salem cigar manufacturer and a Democrat. He is a member of the Salem city council.

W. H. Downing, a Democrat and a member of the State Board of Horticulture, is also among the applicants. Downing is from Shaw.

M. J. McKinnon, of Portland, is also included among those who seek to succeed Superintendent James.

There are a number of other positions for which applications have been received by the state. J. W. Sherwood, of Portland, has professed a desire to be State Insurance Commissioner, but the Governor says he has given this question no thought.

C. V. Galloway was reappointed Saturday to the State Board of Tax Commissioners for a four-year term. Charles L. Dick, Democrat and president of the Salem Fruit Union, is also a member of the State Board of Agriculture. A number of his friends have been active in his behalf. H. W. Hatch, of Salem, is also a candidate for a place on this board.

Annual Jersey Sale.

On a recent visit to the farm of Nelson, at Independence, it was learned that his Orchard herd of Jerseys would be placed before the public at auction early in May, making this the second annual sale held by Mr. Nelson. It will be remembered that early last year Mr. Nelson and J. B. Stump had an importation direct from the Islands, and later Mr. Nelson bought a fine lot at an auction sale in Kentucky, where he paid \$2000 for one bull. It is Mr. Nelson's share of this stock that will be sold. There will also be a lot of young stuff that has been calving since the herd was brought to the Coast. All animals of a suitable age will be bred to his herd. The sale will be immediately preceding the Harry West sale at Scappoose—Oregon Agriculturist.

Adapted to Poultry.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., March 2.—Believing that there is a good field in poultry raising in the Willamette Valley, Henry A. Korf, a grocer of this city, will soon establish a large chicken ranch near this city. Mr. Korf is a member of the National Single Comb Buff Orpington Club. He is a recent arrival from the Middle West, where he was engaged in the chicken business. There he was able to make profits where eggs never rose over 20 cents a dozen and chickens sold at 10 and 12 cents a pound. The cost of raising chickens, he believes, is much less in the Willamette Valley, where there are no cold winters and where the food is cheaper. He will begin his chicken ranch with a stock of about 1200 chickens.

Building Boat.

William Ball is building a boat to be run on the Willamette river between this city and Salem, for the exclusive accommodation of passengers and light freight. Mr. Ball expects to have the boat in operation on or before June 1, next. It will be a double-decked vessel, propelled by a 40 horsepower gasoline engine, which has already been purchased and will be shipped to Independence soon—Independence Enterprise.

A BAD BREAK.

That state experimental station officials now and then get their wires crossed has been shown lately in some disastrous results which have followed the use of commercial lime sulphur as a summer spray for apple scab in the flood river valley. Used at a strength which was considered safe by the directors of the Oregon Agricultural college, a serious burning of the leaves and damaging of the fruit have nevertheless resulted, and so serious is this damage that a quantity of the fruit of this noted section will be rendered second class or worse. In the adoption of a new spray, as in the taking up of some other new things, changed conditions under which the work is carried on may greatly vitiate or render entirely useless what seem to be excellent results achieved in other places.

THE CORN ROOT WORM.

Not in years has the damage from the corn root worm been so great as it is proving to be during the present season. In the state of Iowa alone it is estimated that the damage from this one source will aggregate close to \$20,000,000. Fields that early in the summer gave promise of yielding sixty bushels per acre will be thought to do pretty well if they husk out fifteen. This pest is the legitimate result of a continuous corn after corn system of cropping and seems to be nature's protest at a very prevalent agricultural abuse. The only effective remedy is a system of crop rotation in which some legume and the small grains shall have a prominent place, as the pest subsides when there are no more corn roots in which it may breed and feed.

THE PUBLIC LANDS.

It is a commentary both on the character of some of the lands which the federal government has disposed of and the various methods by which they have been distributed that of the first 8,000 winners in the land drawing of the Cheyenne River and Standing Rock reservations, in North and South Dakota, less than 2,000 have completed their filings to date, while of the 12,000 who have the right to file after Sept. 2 it is hardly likely that a larger percentage will complete their contracts. It would seem high time for devising some less expensive and more effective way of disposing of the public domain which does not have in so large a degree the earmarks of the shell game and gold brick swindle.

Good Roads as Memorials.

Wm. at Mitchell, one of the men of money at Mitchell, Minn., has offered a bonus, said to be as much as \$200, for each mile of good road constructed in Wisconsin county in the next three years. Presumably one of the principal highways leading into the county seat will be known as the Mitchell road. Whether it is or not, the aid given is the creation of a county system of improved highways which will aid Mr. Mitchell to be held in grateful remembrance by future users of the roads.
