BAPTISED IN BULLETS

COMPANY H, OF DALLAS, ENGAGES IN PRACTICE BATTLE.

Captain Toose Issues Challenge to Salem Company For Competitive Drill.

In the midst of war and rumors of war the residents of Dallas slept in undisturbed peacefulness, or made their weekly preparations for church last Sunday morning, totally unconscious of an armed military force, which entered in force and despite a struggle for supremacy within the sound of the sweetly peaceful summons of the Sabbath bells. Amid the glorious morning sunshine, the glittering bayonets flashed defiance from tree to tree, and the voice of bugles gave stirring utterance of sinister commands of martial import. Advancing, retreating, on skirmish line or in almost hand-to-hand conflict, the battle raged and the sound of rattling musketry broke harshly upon the softness of the morning. The neighboring children shinned up a tree in an effort to see and learn what in sam hill was the matter.

Practice Warfare. The cause of the unwonted smoke, smell and noise was Company H's small battle in mimic. Captain Walter L. Toose, Jr., in order to give his men a taste of powder, ordered a practice march and engagement. The company was divided into two platoons of 25 men each, and to every member 20 rounds of blank ammunition was issued. Equipped with guns, belts, bayonets, trenching tools, haversacks, and canteens, they were ready for the fray. The first platoon, under command of First Sergeant Peter S. Greenwood, Jr., left the armory at 8 a. m., taking the Washington and Levens street route out along Elendale avenue, and the Guy road to a point about one mile north of the intersection of these two thoroughfares. The second platoon, under command of Sergeant L. D. Shaw, left the armory at 8:30, following Main street and the Salt Creek road to the Dunlop hill. The first platoon took up a defensive position just north of the Kimball orchard on the creek bank. The second platoon then proceeded to an attack upon the enemy.

Amid Paper Bullets. After about two hours of scouting the two bodies came into contact. For about half an hour the "make-believe" paper bullets flew thick and fast. The first platoon had thrown up breastworks by the use of their trenching tools, and had selected a good place to repel an attack. However, they failed in properly protecting their rear. The second platoon made their attack upon that quarter, but had failed to get a correct understanding of the lay of the land before doing so, and the result was that when they came upon the enemy, they found that there was a lot of brush between them, thus spoiling effective fire upon their part.

Captain Toose acted as umpire, and his decision was that it was a draw. Lieutenant Staffin acted with the first platoon in an advisory capacity, and Sergeant Greenwood with the second platoon. The boys enjoyed their hike of about seven miles and the sham battle very much, and are eager for another one. It is this kind of training that fits men for actual warfare.

Challenges Salem. Captain Toose has issued a challenge to Captain Abrams, Company M, Third Infantry, O. N. G., of Salem, to meet him between here and Salem in a sham battle. The plan will be for Company M to leave Salem on a Saturday afternoon, with the object of capturing Dallas, the capital of the enemy's country. They will select a good place on route to bivouac on Saturday evening. On the same day in the afternoon, Company H will leave Dallas with the object of capturing Salem. They will also bivouac on route. The field of operations will be limited to within a half mile on each side of the main road between Dallas and Salem. This promises to be an interesting affair, and the local men are anxiously awaiting Captain Abrams' acceptance of the challenge. Captain Abrams is an efficient officer and takes a great interest in military affairs, and it is safe to say that he will eagerly grasp this opportunity to give his men a little valuable training. If the arrangements are perfected as set forth, the battle will take place some Sunday morning between here and Salem, and the companies will return to their stations Sunday afternoon.

Hop Stocks Reduced. Stocks of hops in all hands on the Pacific Coast have been reduced fully 50 per cent during the past two weeks. Fully 1200 bales have been shipped out of Oregon alone during that time. Most of these were the holdings of speculative dealers. Few dealers now retain supplies, according to the Portland Journal, and only about 600 bales are held by growers so far as the 1910 crop is concerned. Dealers are making every possible effort to secure contracts on the coming crop along the coast at 15 to 16c a pound. At Sacramento 12c is being offered, but at Sonoma 14c could be secured easily. Growers, however, are not inclined to let go. In this state offers for 1911 are being made freely at 15 1/2 to 16c a pound, but growers are not taking hold. Spot hops are firmer at 18 1/2 to 19c a pound. One set was made two days ago at the higher figure. Outside markets are firm with supplies nominal.

Colombist Rush. If the Oregon colonist rush keeps up for the entire 30 days of low rates as it commenced last week, the total of arrivals will be not far from 45,000. The O.-W. R. N. Company has maintained a daily average of 400 arrivals on five trains, including the Shoshone. Figures on arrivals are not given by the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific, but they approximate the number of 800 a day for both roads, or a total of more than 4000 for the first five days. This makes the grand total for the first five days not far from 8000. They are people principally from the Middle West and Texas. Many are farmers coming to raise crops in Oregon. They are considered the most valuable among all immigrants.—Portland Journal.
