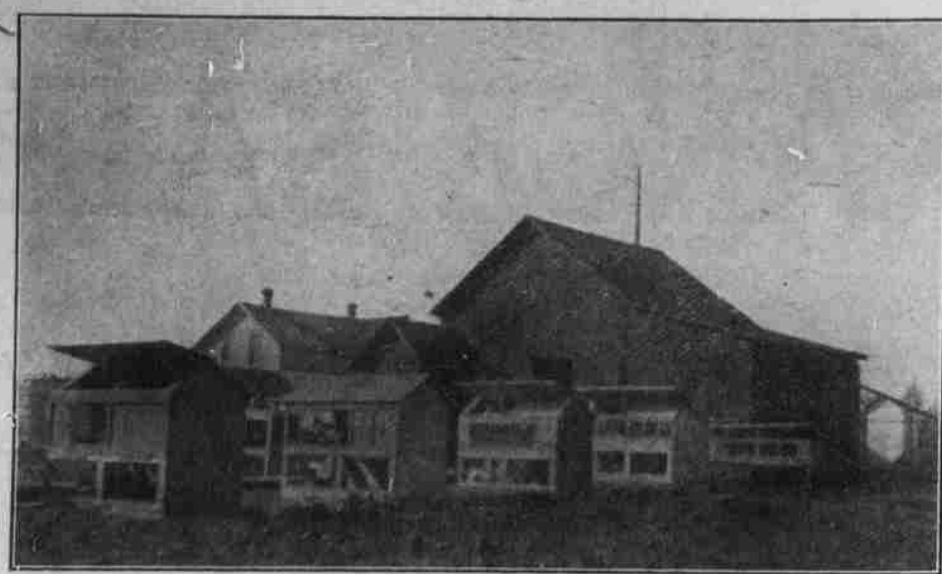

NAMES BEST VARIETIES

LIST OF FRUITS MOST SUITABLE TO VALLEY.

Professor Lewis, of Corvallis, Gives Results of His Experiments and Study.

Professor C. I. Lewis, head of the horticultural department of the State Agricultural College at Corvallis, who was the principal speaker at the two-day fruit growers' meeting held in Dallas several weeks ago, has just been giving some advice in regard to the best varieties of fruit for culture in this part of the valley. As his opinion is the result of extended experiment and careful study, and as the local growers were most favorably impressed by him while he was here, the following extracts from his address will be read with more than usual interest.

The tree fruits he suggests as good ones for this district are apples, pears, peaches, cherries, plums and walnuts; the vine and bush fruits, grapes, red and black raspberries, blackberries, gooseberries, strawberries and currants.

Apples Recommended.
The best varieties of apples for the valley, he says, are Yellow Newtown, Jonathan, Grimes' Golden, Rome Beauty, Gano, Rhode Island Greening, Gravenstein, Orley, Wagner, Spitzenberg and Vanderpool Red.

Pear trees that will bear best here are the Bartlett, d'Anjou, Comice, Patrick, Roray and Cling. Others suggested as worthy of trial are the Glou Moneau, Barry Hardy, Redo and Howell.

Nineteen different varieties of peaches may profitably be grown in the Willamette Valley. Professor Lewis named, in the order of their fruiting, the following as good ones to plant in putting in a peach orchard: Early Alexander, Amosden June, Waterloo, Triumph, Early Columbia, Hale's Early, Mamie Ross, Lovell, Champion, Early Crawford, Early Charlotte, Tuscan Cling, Golden Cling, Muir, Late Crawford, Elberta, Globe, Fitzgerald, and Salway. The most promising of these are the Amosden June, Early Crawford, Early Charlotte, Mamie Ross, Muir, Elberta, Globe and Salway.

Walnuts and Plums.
The Italian prune and the Franquette, Mayotte and Maylan walnuts, and the Satsuma and peach plums are the varieties of these fruits which he named as best suited to this part of Oregon. The Maynard he added as a good home plum, though not so good as the others for shipping.

Three sweet, three sour and two local varieties of cherries were suggested: the Royal Anne, Bing and Lambert for sweet ones; Olivette, Montmorency and Richmond for sour, and May Duke and Late Duke for home consumption.

"I believe that apricots and almonds should be grown sparingly in this valley," said Professor Lewis, "though it is thought by some that the Languedoc and Gross Tendre will thrive here."

Best Small Fruits.
The five kinds of grapes best for this region are the Worden, Concord, Niagara, Delaware and Brighton. For black raspberries the Cumberland and Gregg, and for red, the Cuthbert, Marlborough, Superlative and Antwerp are best. The three best blackberry vines are the Evergreen, Snyder and Mammoth. Four good gooseberry varieties are the Oregon, Downing, Industry and Smith. A similar number of currant varieties—the Perfection, Fay, Victoria and White Grape—are recommended. To the four best strawberry vines for the valley the Gold Dollar, Sixteen to One, Magdon and Clark's Seedling, Mr. Lewis added the Autumn Bell as a good producer.

Ministerial Meeting.
The Salem District Ministerial meeting will hold its annual session in Dallas Tuesday and Wednesday, April 2 and 3. All pastors of this district of the Methodist Episcopal Church are expected to be present, and likely visitors from other parts of the Oregon Conference also. All sessions are always open to the public, and a cordial welcome will be accorded all who come. All the meetings will be in the Methodist church building.

MOHAIR MARKET STEADY

Indications That Values Will Be Slightly Higher Later.

At 32 cents a pound for the best grades, delivered in Portland, the buying of mohair continues on a moderate scale, and despite the bearish talk of some members of the local trade, there seems to be small prospect of the market going off in any serious way in the near future. The indications rather are that it will stiffen to some extent, for it is the rule rather than the exception that the first pool sale of the season puts values slightly above the initial open market basis.

The statement was emphatically made Tuesday that at 32 cents, or anything like that figure, mohair at this time is a speculation, and a hazardous one at that. Nevertheless, that price was freely paid for the first important consignments to the Portland market a week or two ago, and that for the time at least fixed the market, reports the Telegram. At the outset there was but one buyer willing to operate at all freely at the price indicated, but since then, though with a good deal of protest, others have fallen in line. It seems to have been optional with them either to pay the price established at the opening or take over no mohair.

Latest trade reports from the East can hardly be said to favor the dealers who to date have shown a bearish disposition. So far as can be learned at this time mohair stocks in the hands of manufacturers in this country are so small as to be inconsequential, the carry-over from last year in all quarters being very limited. This naturally gives the market a firmer undertone than would otherwise be the case.

The mohair output of the country at the best is small, and with the steadily increasing demand in recent years for mohair manufactures of all kinds the value of the raw material has been gradually working upward, and unlike wool, there have been no serious accumulations of stocks anywhere.

There is, of course, the possibility that the projected revision of the tariff may work some general change in mohair values, but when and to what extent the market will be hit, if at all, by the lawmakers at Washington is a matter yet to be determined. The first pool sale of the season in this state is scheduled to take place at Dallas Saturday, April 15. That sale is expected to place the market on a definite basis.

To Protect Caves.

At the request of Hon. C. B. Watson of Ashland, Oregon, Mr. Hawley has requested the secretary of agriculture to suggest a proper bill to develop and protect the Josephine County caves, which have been set aside as a national monument. Because of the acts of careless people and others addicted to vandalism, many of the beauties of these marble halls have been defaced, and it is proposed by Mr. Watson, through legislation which he requests Mr. Hawley to secure, to protect the chambers already opened, open others known to exist, construct roads, trails, etc., and make the caves and sights accessible to the public. There is much water power in the vicinity which may be used to generate electricity for lighting purposes, as it is thought candles and torches should not be used in the caves—Salem Statesman.

State Aids Game.

SALEM, April 5.—Governor West has announced that arrangements are being made for putting into use at once the new law authorizing creation of wild game and bird preserves on state owned lands, and that through business firms in Portland, who have agents in China, large importations of China pheasants will be made to these preserves at once. For two years China pheasants are protected by law and the governor believes that by the end of that period pheasants will be plentiful in Oregon. The asylum farm will be utilized at once for breeding both China and Reeves pheasants. The governor says that one patient at the asylum farm spends his whole time watching squirrels, and such patients, he thinks, can be instructed in the work of propagating wild game birds with profit to the state.

Refuses to Vote Bonds.

SHERIDAN, April 4.—The vote to bond this city for \$10,000 for the erection of a new high school building, was lost at the recent school election. The vote stood 161 to 8 against the expenditure of such a sum and much adverse criticism is attending the defeat of the petitioners for the proposed new school house. Those voting against the bonding argue that Sheridan has as fine educational facilities as any town in the valley, and they point out the fact that the present high school building is practically new. It is very probable that another election on the same question will be ordered soon.

LOGGING ROAD MODEL

SHORT LINE CONNECTS CARLTON WITH RICH TIMBER BELT.

Predicted That It Will Eventually Be Extended to Tap Tillamook Country.

What the owners and contractors believe to be the best built logging road in the state, has just been completed between Carlton, on the west side line of the Southern Pacific, to Fairdale, 16 miles northwest. Carlton is located on the Corvallis-Forrest Grove line to Portland, seven miles north of McMinnville and 20 miles from Dallas.

The road is the property of the Carlton Lumber Company, and was built primarily as a logging road, although the owners propose to accept both freight and passenger business. Most of the rights of way were secured with the proviso that the line be made a common carrier.

Expensive Construction.
Watson, Plagg & Standifer, contractors, finished their work Tuesday, according to the Oregonian. The road will be open to traffic about May 1. The line is standard gauge, equipped with 40-pound rails and thoroughly ballasted.

For nearly the entire distance between the two terminals it follows the course of the North Yamhill River. Considerable grading was necessary, however, and the average cost of construction per mile approximated \$10,000. Equipment has been ordered and will be delivered in a few days. Several small locomotives will be placed in service, and in addition to the logging cars a number of freight cars and a passenger coach will be used.

May Go To Tillamook.

While the freight and passenger business necessarily will be handled merely as an accommodation to patrons of the line, it is expected that this department will grow until it becomes an important part of the business. Already there is promise of a number of new stations springing up, and the company is considering the advisability of constructing freight and passenger depots.

At present the road is owned by private capital, but it will be a feeder to the Southern Pacific. It is predicted that eventually it will be acquired by the Harriman interests and used as a part of a line extending to Tillamook Bay. This route would be shorter than any between Portland and Tillamook and would cost less to build, it is asserted.

Located in Portland.

C. N. McArthur, speaker of the Oregon Legislature at the session of 1909, and private secretary to Governor Benson and Acting Governor Bowers, has located in Portland and opened law offices in the Yeon building. Prior to his removal to Salem, two years ago, Mr. McArthur practiced his profession in this city for a number of years, first with the firm of Snow & McCamant and afterwards independently. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon and a son of the late Judge McArthur, one of Oregon's pioneer jurists—Oregonian.
