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PASSING OF A PIONEER

"UNCLE JOE" SAVERY DIES AT AGE OF 78 YEARS.

Sturdy Old Settler Had Been Resident of Polk County For Over Half a Century.

Joseph Henry Savery, for over half a century a resident of Polk County, died at his home on Jefferson street, in this city, Sunday morning, April 9, at 4:30 o'clock, after a short illness, at the advanced age of 78 years, 5 months and 16 days.

Since June, 1905, Mr. Savery had made his home with his wife in Dallas, and until a week or so ago he was seen daily on the streets, stopping here and there along the way to chat with this and that one of his great number of friends. His long period of residence had made him acquainted with almost every one, and he took great delight in his friendly verbal contests with those whom he met. Of pioneer training and life, he was sturdy in mind and body, and beneath a feigned brusqueness which he liked to assume, was a very kind and generous heart.

Among the younger men of the city he was especially well known and equally well liked, and none will feel his departure more keenly.

Strong Figure. He was a strong and noted figure in the community in which he lived, and was a past master of Salt Creek Grange. He never sought honors nor office. In politics he was an uncompromising and unalterable Democrat; in business he was absolutely and invariably honest and thoroughly conscientious.

He was born in Floyd County, Indiana, October 23, 1832. With his parents he moved to Iowa and later to Oregon, coming across the plains with an ox team. They arrived in Oregon in 1853, and on his twenty-first birthday he first reached the spot where his father and mother, G. B. and Catherine Savery, up their donation land claim, eight miles north of Dallas, and near where the town of Perrydale now stands. He lived there until his removal to Dallas six years ago.

He married Miss Hulda J. Kimsey April 12, 1871, and had lived until tomorrow he would have celebrated the fortieth anniversary of the event, which took place on the old Kimsey farm north of Dallas.

Surviving Relatives. He is survived by his widow and by four of the five sons born to them. The latter are: Ora and Tracy, who are in business in Portland; Ralph, who resides on the old home place; and Henry, who lives in Dallas, all of whom are now here.

The funeral was conducted at 1 p. m. this afternoon, at the family home in this city, by the Reverend Barton Z. Riggs, of Perrydale, who was an intimate and lifelong friend of the old settler. The body was taken to Salt Creek, and there laid away in the quiet little pioneer cemetery.

In the death of "Uncle Joe" Savery, the community has lost another of the sturdy pioneers who reached the Oregon country from the wilderness and helped to place it in its present proud position in the American commonwealth. The life work of this good citizen and neighbor, and his passing at a ripe old age bring vividly to mind the lines of Dean Collins' beautiful poem, "The Gift of the Pioneers," read at the Polk County Pioneer Reunion, two years ago:

The Gift of the Pioneers. The tale of the marching squadrons, Of freemen sturdy and hale— Who laughed at the clouds of danger Abroad o'er the Oregon trail; The song of the bitter struggle, Through weariest months and years; The sturdy fight for a freeman's right, The gift of the pioneers.

Little we ken the labor— We of the younger race— That builded the tangled woodlands Into a garden of pleasured days; Little we ken the combat, The struggle of man with Fate, That cleft us away from the Hudson Bay, And made us a sovereign state.

We pride in the growing cities, Where wailing forests stood, Yet the price of our peace and plenty Was paid in our fathers' blood; Not shed in the rush of fighting, With battle banner unfurled, But drained by the strife for the bread of life With an elemental world.

Count we the wealth of our cities, The wealth of our fields and farms, The wealth that swims to our rivers From the Father Ocean's arms? These are the fruits of a sowing Scattered in former years— A largesse of grace to a younger race— A gift from the pioneers.

Heap up the wealth of those cities, The wealth of those fields and farms, The wealth that rests in the mountains' breasts, And swims from the ocean's arms— And never can we repay it, Our debt to those bitter years That paid for the gift that our young hands lift.

From the hands of the pioneers, Who came as in marching squadrons— Freemen sturdy and hale— And laughed at the clouds of danger Abroad o'er the Oregon trail; Who stood in the bitter struggle Through weariest months and years And gave to our hands these western lands— The gift of the pioneers.
