

FINAL TRIBUTE IS PAID

Funeral of Late Secretary of State Held at Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, April 18.—The body of the late Frank Benson, Secretary of State and Oregon's 13th Governor, was buried here today with impressive ceremony. It is estimated that 1000 persons attended the funeral, prominent among whom were Governor West, Secretary of State Elliott, State Treasurer Kay, State Superintendent of Schools Alderman, Judge McBride, of Salem, Judge Webster and C. N. McArthur, of Portland.

Services were conducted at both the Elks' Temple and the grave and were under the auspices of the Elks, Odd Fellows and Woodmen lodges. George M. Brown, who delivered the eulogy upon behalf of the Elks, characterized Mr. Benson as the most popular and distinguished man in Douglas County.

"More than 30 years ago, as a teacher in the Umpqua Academy, at Willamette, Corvallis, and his companions on the trip were R. P. Shier, president of the Black Eagle Mining Company; Attorney W. S. Risley of Albany, and G. W. Humphrey, of Jefferson.

At the conclusion of the exercises at the Elks' Temple the body was taken to the Odd Fellows' cemetery under escort of the Odd Fellows, Elks, Woodmen and Company D. Oregon National Guard, where the final rites of the Odd Fellows lodge took place. Judge Thomas P. Ryan, of Oregon City, was master of ceremonies.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful and showed in a measure the universal esteem in which Mr. Benson was held throughout the state.

Most of those who attended the funeral from a distance left for their homes tonight.

WILL GATHER AT CHAMPOEG

Pioneers to Celebrate Establishment of Provisional Government.

On May 2 the sixty-eighth anniversary of the establishment of the provisional government of Oregon will be celebrated at Champog. Judge F. H. D'Arcy will be president of the day, and Hon. Charles B. Moore, of Salem, will deliver the principal address.

Sixty-eight years ago the pioneers of the Oregon country gathered at Champog, the little hamlet in the northwestern corner of what is now Marion County, and decided the measure of whether the Oregon country was to be British or American.

The vote was close, 50 favoring the British and 52 the American. F. X. Mathison, a French Canadian, and Peter Lueler cast the deciding ballots. Mathison is the sole survivor of that historic gathering, and he will be present at the celebration.

The action taken by the gathering at Champog in 1842 established the first white man's government west of the Rockies. It was a provisional government, and later resulted in the territory of Oregon being formed.

The origin of this convention was a peculiar one, relates the Salem Statesman. The pioneers were bothered with wolves that destroyed their flocks of cattle, and meetings were called to devise ways and means of protection against this form of loss, for in those days, cattle were a great source of wealth to the scattered pioneers.

Three such meetings were held and were commonly called "wolf meetings."

The third of these meetings became the constitutional convention, for the pioneers found that some kind of government was a necessity, and it was decided to take action.

Each year the pioneers gather at Champog to celebrate the occasion in a grove where speeches are heard. An attempt was made to secure a memorial building for these occasions and a movement to that end was launched. It was successful in securing the passage of an appropriation through the house of representatives during the last session of the legislature, but the bill was killed in the senate.

WOMEN'S MISSION CONVENTION

CORVALLIS, April 18.—Friday, May 5, the eighth annual convention of the Oregon branch of the Women's Home Mission Society of the Evangelical Church will open in this city, the work to extend over four days, and a good program has been prepared. "A Message From a Chinese Evangelist" will be the subject of Rev. Mr. Huang on Friday, and on the same day Mrs. Myra M. Stuffer will deliver her annual address. On Saturday Dr. C. C. Ayers, of Dallas, will talk and Mrs. A. E. Ayers will preach. Sunday morning Mrs. Dr. Ayers will have charge of the services at the Evangelical church, and as she has just returned from Bombay, India, where she was engaged in missionary work, that country will be her subject.

Mr. Lafferty says he sees no reason why the bill should not pass.

AUTO MAKES HARD TRIP

Machine Covers 70 Miles of Mountain Road in Mine.

ALBANY, Or., April 18.—The first automobile trip ever made into the Gold Creek mining district, was made by officers of the Black Eagle Mining Company, Saturday. The party returned here today, reporting that though the machine went through a foot of snow part of the way and in deep mud at places on the mountain grades, the trip was made successfully.

The party left Albany at 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning and reached the Black Eagle mine at 5 o'clock Saturday night, traveling a distance of 70 miles. On the return trip the automobile left the mine at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, and reached Albany at 6 o'clock in the evening.

The automobile which made this initial trip over the new road to the mines was owned and driven by Mark Richard, of Corvallis, and his companions on the trip were R. P. Shier, president of the Black Eagle Mining Company; Attorney W. S. Risley of Albany, and G. W. Humphrey, of Jefferson.

BIG WELL IS YET UNCHECKED

Walla Walla Valley Folk Worry Over Draining of Reservoir.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 18.—Efforts to check the now famous Kelly artesian well have all proven in vain, and owners of other wells in the valley are becoming alarmed over the possibility of this one huge well draining the reservoir that supplies the artesian well. Casing after casing has been sunk in vain endeavors to control the flow of the well, but the water has always washed up around the casing, and the only result is a bigger hole and more water. It is estimated the flow now is between 400 and 500 gallons a minute.

Experts from the oil districts may be summoned to cap the well or the plan used in oil districts of checking the flow by the weight of the water may be used. In this case a tank 20 or 30 feet high would be built and as the water would not flow above the top, the flow would be stopped and capped.

The bore of the well is now nearly 12 inches, and washing larger every day.

PRICE OF TIMBER LIMITED

Lafferty Offers Bill to Prevent Government's Raising It.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 18.—Congressman Lafferty introduced a bill to require the sale of unreserved timber land to individuals at \$2.50 an acre, in tracts not exceeding 160 acres to any one purchaser.

Until two years ago the timber and stone act had been construed to require the sale of timber lands to the Interior Department in November, 1909, practically repealed this act by providing timber lands be sold only at appraised value. The object of the Lafferty bill is to virtually restore the timber and stone act. He claims the act has never been repealed by Congress, and there is no evidence of Congress' action as to the Interior Department in abrogating the same by the issuance of regulations.

Lafferty introduced a bill appropriating \$150,000 for a public building at Astoria.

Also a bill authorizing a homestead-er to offer commutation proof after 14 months' residence, regardless of intentions at time of entry.

Club Contest Inaugurated.

CORVALLIS, April 18.—The members of the Commercial Club, divided into two opposing sections, the Reds and Blues, are engaging in a contest for members, the losing division to pay for a dinner for the other side. Pin-ochle, billiards, pool, checkers and several other kind of game and amusement ingeniously can devise are being made features of the contest. Races, baseball games, street cleaning contests and many other amusing features are scheduled for a later date and will attract the attention of the whole city to the work that the Commercial Club is doing.

Cubs May Vote Road Bonds.

MAIRHPFIELD, April 18.—County Judge Hall has announced that nothing can be done toward bonding the county to raise funds for road improvements until the next general election. Commercial bodies of the county have taken up the subject of raising \$1,000,000 for roads by a bond issue, but according to the ruling of the Attorney-General this can only be brought up and voted upon at a general election. At a meeting to be held soon the subject will be discussed and steps may be taken to submit the question to the voters at the next general election. The commercial bodies all favor bonding for a sufficient sum to build permanent roads in Coos County.
