STOCKMAN ASKS DAMAGES

W. J. Domes Brings Action Against W. O. Morrow For \$5000.

A lawsuit that will be certain to create much interest among the livestock breeders of Polk County was begun this week when W. J. Domes, a prominent cattleman of McCoy, brought an action against W. O. Morrow, a Rickreall cattle breeder, for \$5000 damages for alleged injury to his reputation and business.

Domes charges that Morrow wrote and caused to be published an article in the Rural Spirit accusing him of "crooked work" in connection with the awarding of premiums at the State Fair cattle show last year, at which time Domes was given first prize on aged Jersey cows and Morrow came out second best. The McCoy man charges that Morrow's article is false and defamatory and that it was written for the purpose of injuring Domes' reputation and business among the cattlemen of the Pacific Northwest.

Domes demands judgment against Morrow in the sum of \$5000, together with his costs and disbursements.

WILL START DRILL MONDAY

Dallas Company to Seek For Oil on G. W. McBea Place.

The Polk County Oil, Gas, Coal & Land Company, of Dallas, will begin the actual work of drilling for oil at the well on the G. W. McBea place, about two and a half miles west of this city, Monday, May 8, at 10 o'clock a. m. An invitation has been extended to the stockholders of the company and to the general public to be present. The machinery is on the ground ready for operation, and the work will be continued as fast as circumstances will permit.

The drill will be under the direction of John Farrell, assistant manager. Fred Laramie will have charge of the engine and will assist in drilling, and several others will be employed in different parts of the work.

The board of directors of the company consists of Simon Haines, president; Fred J. Wagner, manager; and John Farrell, assistant manager. R. H. Smith is secretary and treasurer.
