CHURCHES WILL HOLD SERVICES SUNDAY.

May 14, a Mothers' Day, with a general custom of the day, will be observed in Dallas.

At the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Reverend George F. Hopkins, pastor, will deliver a sermon, the subject will be "Mother," at the regular 11 o'clock morning service, and the exercises will be in harmony with the subject.

Presbyterian Church. At the Presbyterian Church, the pastor, the Reverend Edgar W. Miles, will devote the morning services to the observance of the spirit of the day. The topic of the sermon which he will preach at 11 o'clock is "A Mother's Aspirations."

United Evangelical. In recognition of the tender significance which attaches to the day, the Reverend C. P. Gates, pastor of the United Evangelical Church, will deliver a special sermon at 8 p. m., the subject of which will be "The Mothers of Men."

Cases in Justice Court.

Hugh Williams was tried before Justice of the Peace Hardy Holman recently on a charge of assault and battery upon A. N. Arnold, teacher of the Airline school. SHORT TERM OF COURT

ONLY ONE JURY CASE TRIED AT MARCH TERM.

Session Begins Monday and Ends Wednesday Morning, Judge Percy R. Kelly Presiding.

The May term of Circuit Court for Polk County, Department No. 1, adjourned Wednesday morning after a session lasting less than three days. Only one jury case was tried—the action of Mrs. Sophia Gregory vs. Miss Agnes O'Keefe and others, to recover the sum of \$400 alleged to be due as the purchase price of the Dallas Hospital. The jury found in favor of Mrs. Gregory, and also in favor of Doctors B. H. McCallion, A. B. Starbuck and L. A. Bollman, who had been named as defendants in the action.

Judge Kelly's prompt and business-like way of conducting court, his courteous manner toward the members of the bar, and his companionable qualities as a man won for him the respect and esteem of all who attended his first session of court in Polk County, or who had the pleasure of meeting him personally during his short stay in Dallas. None but words of praise are heard for the new Judge of Department No. 1, the people feeling that they have in him an efficient and conscientious officer.
