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TO BUILD TABERNACLE HERE

Big Crew of Volunteers Will Erect Structure Next Saturday.

Arrangements are rapidly being made for the Olsen-Moss revival meeting to be held on the Christian Church grounds at the corner of Clay and Jefferson streets. The lumber for the big tabernacle to be erected there next Saturday is being hauled, and it is thought that by tomorrow the 35,000 feet required will have all been delivered and ready for the builders. The tabernacle is to be 60 by 100 feet in size, and will be large enough to seat 1500 people. Although only a temporary structure, it will be made weather proof, and will have a prepared roof cover so that meetings can be held regardless of the elements.

The preliminary work of laying the foundation will begin Friday with a small band of men. The actual work of putting up the building and finishing it in one day will be commenced Saturday morning, when it is intended to have a force of 100 willing, hustling volunteer workmen on the grounds by 7 o'clock, to carry the construction forward with a rush. Numbers of the leading business men and office-holders of the city have agreed to get in and drill and smash their thumbs and look pleasant about it. All those who have not offered their assistance are requested to do so at once by calling up the Reverend Leon L. Myers, phone 1451. Every man who attends is urged to take a hammer and saw with him—three kegs of nails and plenty of timber to drive them into will be furnished.

The construction Saturday will partake of the nature of the old-time "raids" when the whole countryside round about, men, women and children turned out-and toiled to good purpose, and had a good time while they did it. At noon, a basket picnic dinner will be spread for the benefit of workers, and good cooks from the four points of the compass are preparing to send or take the best their larder and skill affords. Hot coffee will be served by the gallon, and an amateur hospital corps will be present and properly equipped with bandages, liniment and soothing salves and words of sympathy for all those who add to the general festivities by sawing off a finger.

The preparation and distribution of the noonday luncheon will be under the management of a committee consisting of Mrs. Harry McDonald, Mrs. M. D. Ellis, Mrs. Eugene Hayter, Mrs. J. A. McCann, Mrs. H. G. Campbell, and Mrs. Leon L. Myers. The Moss family of four members will arrive Friday, and Evangelist Olsen is expected here Wednesday, May 24, from Clarkston, Washington, where he is conducting a meeting. The first of the revival services here will be held in the tabernacle Saturday evening next.

GRANTED FIXED SALARY COURT HOUSE NOTES

City Engineer Refuses to Accept 60 Cents An Hour For Services.

A regular meeting of the city council was held Monday night, at which it was decided to instruct the street committee to hire M. D. Coulter to continue sprinkling the streets until after the passage of an ordinance levying an occupation tax.

The street committee was instructed to purchase a steam drill for use in the city rock quarry. The plant there has been placed in charge of Mr. Stewart, and will be put in operation shortly.

Tracy Staats was appointed to membership on the library board, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late M. M. Ellis.

F. H. Morrison, who was appointed city engineer at the former meeting, refused to accept 60 cents an hour, and was accordingly hired at a salary of \$125 per month.

It was estimated that it would cost \$1200 to improve the road from D. P. Stouffer's corner on Main street to the foot of the Dimick hill, and the work was ordered started.

A new fund was created to handle the money received from the County Court for the construction of roads.

SOUTHERN HOPS DAMAGED

Contract Price Said to Advance Here and at Sonoma.

At last definite news is coming regarding the high prices being offered and paid for hops. Twenty-one cents is now being freely offered for the better lots in the Sonoma, California, section, according to advice received by the Portland Journal, while in other sections of California the price of contracts has been placed at 20c.

Offers of 20½c are being freely made for Oregon contracts on the 1911 crop and it is stated that one grower was offered 21c. The activity in hop contracts at this time among coast dealers is due to the serious condition of the yards in the Sonoma section.

A special advice received by a local dealer this morning, stated that the hop yards around Markwest and Santa Rosa creek are from two to three feet under water as a general rule and the roots are rotting.

It will be impossible to estimate the damage in that section until the water disappears. Many missing hills are shown in the Sonoma section. A year ago at this time tying of hop vines had been practically completed there, but this season operations are not yet started. The season has been extremely backward.

CIVIL WAR VETERANS MEET

A meeting of Civil war veterans was held at the court house last Friday evening to arrange for the observance of Memorial Day. J. A. Martin was elected president, and B. WILL IMPROVE RIVER BANK

Government Boats Will Build Levee and Deepen Channel at Salem.

SALEM, May 15.—The government snagboat Mathioma and the dredger Champeog are here and will begin operations within a short time in improving the west bank of the river for a distance of half a mile. For many years the high waters of the Willamette have gradually washed away the banks, extending from the steel bridge to a point opposite West Salem, and as the result of the continual wash that section suffers damage each year from high water.

It is the plan of the government engineers to throw up a heavy superembankment along the west side of the river and deepen the channel running along the affected portion, so that the river cannot go over the banks and flood the farm lands in that district. The dredger will also do some work on the west side of Minto's gravel bar, which will tend to throw the current of the stream nearer to Salem.
