

AN FITTING OBSERVANCE
People Will Participate in
Memorial Exercises.

Meeting attended by nearly all the committees on Memorial Day exercises was held in the city chamber Tuesday night, and a plan was outlined for the exercises. It was decided that the exercises would be a more suitable time for holding the parade, and the idea of having it in the morning was accordingly abandoned. The procession, headed by the Dallas High School band, will be led by the old soldiers occupying the position of honor, through the principal streets to the cemetery. The local company of state militia, other bodies, will take part, and other interesting features of the marching of the pupils of the public schools. The national color will be borne at the head of each column, and every child will carry a flag. They will appear in the procession down town, but will disband before going to the cemetery. The ceremonies at the cemetery will consist of an invocation, reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address, an address by the Reverend George F. Gates, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and benediction. The service will be interspersed with appropriate vocal and hand music. An attempt will be made to decorate every grave in the Dallas and I. P. cemeteries. The old soldiers will be decorated by the Grand Army of the Republic, and the unknown dead. All those who have relatives among the dead buried in either of the cemeteries are urged to request the names and designate the location of the graves to Mayor J. R. Myers, as it is the wish of the veterans to mark them with flowers and later to put up a standard monument at the head of the graves. These markers are furnished by the War Department. It is the intention to put the cemeteries in order, and all who can assist in that much needed work will be there Monday morning, May 21. H. L. Fenton will be present with men to assist. Inasmuch as there are numerous unmarked graves, an effort will be made to locate them and put up suitable markers, which R. L. Chapman agreed to provide. Everyone that gives any information regarding the identity of the unmarked graves will communicate with either Mayor Myers or H. L. Fenton. A large quantity of flowers will be used, and all who can furnish any requested to send them to Webb's confectionery, where they will be taken care of and turned over to the proper committee. For the purpose of purchasing the necessary flags to be used by the children, a committee consisting of A. B. Muir, H. L. Fenton, and Mayor W. I. Ford was appointed by Mayor Craven, chairman of the meeting. Professor H. H. Dunkelberger, Dallas College, was named as a committee of one to select a suitable place to read Lincoln's address. All the details will be turned over from time to time to the program committee of which U. S. Grant is the executive chairman.

To Deliver Address.
The Reverend C. P. Gates, pastor of United Evangelical Church of this city, has accepted an invitation to deliver the address to the graduating class of the Paulsen High School, of Portland, Thursday, May 25.

SILETZ REGULATIONS READY
Entrymen to Make Application in Sixty Days, With Proof.

The Observer has received from Congressman Hawley a copy of the regulations issued by the General Land Office for carrying out the provisions of the Hawley bill for the relief of the Siletz entrymen. The circular of instructions is directed to the Portland Land Office, which is requested to notify all entrymen whose entries have not been canceled that they may, within 60 days from such notice, present their applications for patent. The instructions are brief and it is said that the Department will be very liberal in carrying out the provisions of the bill in every instance where the entryman has acted in good faith with the Government.

In all cases where bona fide entries, under which proofs were made prior to December 31, 1906, have been canceled solely because such proofs failed to show the residence, cultivation, and improvements required by the laws under which such entries were made, the entrymen may, at any time before September 6, 1911, present their applications for the reinstatement of their entries and patents thereunder, under this act.

Affidavits and showings must accompany and be filed with all applications for patents under uncanceled entries and with all applications for reinstatement of and patents under canceled entries, as follows:

The affidavit of the applicants that their entries were made for their own exclusive use and benefit, and that no part of the lands entered by them has been sold or conveyed, or contracted to be sold or conveyed; and by the affidavit of the entryman, corroborated by the oaths of two other persons, specifically showing:

(a) The size, character and value of the house or houses built by them on the land, and the dates at which they were built.

(b) The period, character and extent of the applicant's occupation of the land.

(c) The extent, character, and period of the applicants' cultivation of the land and the area cultivated during each year.

Upon receipt of the applications under this act, the Portland Land Office is directed to forward them, with its report and recommendations thereon, to the Chief of Field Division, who, after such investigation as he may deem necessary, will forward the applications to the General Land Office with his report and recommendations.

The payment of \$2.50 per acre, required by the act, will not be demanded until after favorable action has been taken by the General Land Office, due notice of which will be given the entryman through the Portland office.

FORMER RESIDENT DROWNED
John W. Johnson Meets Death in Waters of Columbia River.

John W. Johnson, who was a resident of Dallas in December, 1909, and accidentally drowned in the Columbia river, Tuesday afternoon, somewhere above Portland. The news was received here by Willis Simonon, secretary of the Dallas Assembly No. 26, of the United Artisans, of which Johnson had been a member. The telegram was sent by the supreme land, in an effort to locate relatives of Johnson, who are said to be residents of Polk County. It is understood that he had a sister living in Dallas or near here, but a diligent search made by Mr. Simonon and others has failed to find any trace of her.

Little is known of the dead man here, but it is thought that he was of Swedish descent. Mr. Simonon is anxious to get in communication with his relatives, or with some one who can give directions for finding them as speedily as possible.

WORKERS WILL HEAR TOASTS
Erection of Big Tabernacle Will Be Started This Afternoon.

SCHOOL ELECTION MONDAY
Taxpayers Will Decide Question of Buying Academy Property.

A special election has been called by the board of directors of Dallas school district, to be held in this city next Monday, May 22, for the purpose of deciding whether or not the taxpayers wish to vote bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for the purchase of the property owned by the LaCreole Academy, and to be used for public schools here. Three judges and two clerks will be selected at a meeting of the directors, to conduct the election. The voting place will be in the council chamber, in the city hall, and the polls will be open from 1 to 4 p. m.

All taxpayers in this district, men and women, whose names are shown on the last assessment rolls, are entitled to vote.

CLUB FAVORS PURCHASE
RELIEVES DISTRICT SHOULD BUY ACADEMY PROPERTY.

Move Made to Bring Fruit Packing and Shipping Plant to Dallas.

By unanimous vote the Dallas Commercial Club decided at its regular meeting in the court house Wednesday night, to endorse the move to vote \$20,000 bonds next Monday for the purpose of purchasing the LaCreole Academy property for the use of the Dallas public school district, and on motion of U. S. Loughary every voter in the district was urged to cast his ballot in favor of the proposition. The decision was reached only after deliberation and consideration of the merits of the case, and after Judge D. P. Stouffer, of the board of trustees of LaCreole Academy and Acting President A. A. Winter, of Dallas College, had given succinct and frank statements answering criticisms that had been made.

The matter was brought up by N. L. Guy, who said that he desired a clearer understanding of the question. Answering him, Judge Stouffer explained what the sale of the property meant to the LaCreole Academy; that the expenses were greater than the income from the endowment; that estimates showed that it could not be maintained on less than the income from a \$20,000 fund; that the only way to obtain that amount to establish the fund was to sell the land for that sum; that it was not a question of price but of getting money enough to run the academy school; and furthermore that it had never been offered for sale at \$15,000.

Needs of College.
President Winter presented the need of new buildings and larger grounds. The growth of high schools in the county, and especially of the one in Dallas, made greater demands upon the college, and it was necessary to keep pace with these demands. The high schools would prove of great benefit to the college, which would also draw students from the academy department. But the academy could not be continued by itself. Its present income was not sufficient. He did not consider the price asked was exorbitant, viewed in the light of the needs of the district, the advance of real estate values, and the future requirements of the high school, and that when it filled up the district would have to purchase more grounds and erect a building for the grades, and that it was a question of voting \$20,000 now or likely \$40,000 in two years. Dallas College had a great future and it was desirable to prepare for it now. The recent endorsement of the College by the Evangelical Association meant a twofold constituency, and the indications were that it would be still further endorsed.

Money Kept in Dallas.
The money for the buildings, he said, was to be raised by solicitation, not alone in Dallas or in Polk County, but throughout the length and breadth of the entire conference district. The money obtained from the sale of the Academy property would be used for an endowment fund, but would be in the hands of the trustees of the Academy and would not be allowed to leave Dallas. Having the income from this endowment to add to their resources, the College could draw on its own fund, which now is required to be kept intact. He said that they planned to build a \$40,000 administration building this summer. If they could do that there were various sources in the East from which they could obtain funds for the erection of minor buildings, in carrying out their plans for a complete and modern institution of learning.

Following President Winter's remarks favoring the purchase of the property were made by Edwin Jacobson, Mayor J. R. Craven, U. S. Loughary, N. L. Guy and H. G. Campbell. Mayor Craven believed that it would be better for the school district to procure the property than it would be for it to fall into private hands.

The Commercial Club is endeavoring to secure a branch fruit packing and shipping establishment here, and Acting Secretary Wilbur Ross read a telegram which had been sent to the office of the company, calling its attention to the superior advantages of Dallas for an institution of that sort. It was guaranteed that there would be from 25 to 30 carloads of prunes here each year with the present orchard resources, and that the hundreds of acres planted in the past four years would soon increase the amount materially. Stress was laid on the fact that this is the best prune district in the state, where a crop failure has never been known, and an offer of one acre of land was made to the company if they would establish a plant here soon. Edwin Jacobson and H. G. Campbell were appointed to prepare a letter setting forth still further advantages of this locality.

Want Fish Hatchery.
Resolutions were passed inviting the state board of Fish and Game Commissioners to visit the private hatchery on the John Teal place, near Falls City, before coming to a definite decision regarding the establishment of additional hatcheries projected. The location, it was stated, was ideal and few others offered such advantages.

Information having been received that the Dayton Mutual Insurance Company was planning to move its head office, V. P. Fiske urged the passage of a resolution asking that Dallas be chosen for the new location. V. P. Fiske, U. S. Loughary and H. G. Campbell were appointed to draft the invitation.

A request for information from a man in the East who wished to establish a commission house here was read, and the acting secretary was instructed to confer with the merchants in the city in regard to it.

A total of \$2940 was reported pledged to the soliciting committee, and a sub-committee, composed of U. S. Loughary, J. C. Hayter and N. L. Guy was appointed to assist in the work to be done.

The Board of Managers was authorized to employ a suitable person to collect the monthly dues and subscriptions.

Bakery Moved.
Pending the removal of the one-story frame building on the southwest corner of Main and Court streets, C. C. Mulkey, proprietor of the Dallas Bakery, has moved his stock of goods from his former location to a portion of L. H. Shultz's grocery store, a few doors west, where an attractive display is made behind one of the large plate glass windows there.
