DALLAS FRUIT GROWERS' ASSOCIATION OFFERS PRIZES.

Initial Horticultural Exhibit to Be Held in This City in November.

In order to start things horticulturally, and to show that it is alive and up to the minute, the Dallas Fruit Growers' Association will hold an apple fair in Dallas some time during the early part of November. The exact date has not been decided upon yet, but will be announced later. While making no attempt at an elaborate display, it is the intention to start the movement for an annual exhibition of this character that will be of great assistance in engineering interest and pride in the wonderful products that Polk County is capable of growing. The men behind the movement are experienced in affairs and are acquainted with the local resources, and will make a success of it, paying the way to larger fairs that will become permanent and necessary institutions in the county's welfare and growth.

DECORATION DAY AT BETHEL
Residents of Neighborhood Will Beautify Polk's Historic Cemetery.

BETHEL, Or., May 17.—Decorations will be observed in the cemetery at this place. A brief address will be delivered, after which the graves will be decorated with flowers.
The residents of this neighborhood are glad that a movement is being made to beautify the historic Bethel cemetery, which is now only a tangled mass of myrtle and briars. The work of improving the ground is under the direction of S. W. Gass, whose intention is to remove the undergrowth that has hidden many graves from view. After the cemetery is cleared, flowers will be planted and the monuments straightened up, and an effort will be made to keep the grounds in a neat condition.
The Bethel cemetery was donated by the early settlers for a free burial ground and many persons prominent in the days of pioneer Oregon are buried there. Mr. Gass is to be commended for his work in cleaning up the premises, and should receive the assistance of all in his work. Any aid, no matter how little, will be gladly accepted. Every person having a friend or relative buried there will doubtless be glad to help as soon as they learn of the good work that is being done.

School Sanitation.
Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman has requested that all school districts in the county be held June 19, and that after a thorough inspection of the grounds and buildings, a report be made to the state board of education. This is for the purpose of bringing the sanitary condition of the schools throughout the state up to a higher standard. Mr. Alderman has received questions covering various points in sanitary methods, and these lists are being sent out to all school districts. The reports will be submitted to a state committee after the board of education has looked over them, the committee being connected with the national educational association. The reports will be used at the convention of the association at San Francisco in July, to show the condition of the schools in Oregon.—Salem Statesman.

New Plant Life.
CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 15.—E. P. Wilson, of the Harvard arboretum, has returned, bringing many new species of plant life. The new plants include: lilac, hedge green, clematis, cypress, holly and hollyhock. He believes within a few years will supplant the species hitherto known to botanists, and will create a new race of beautiful flowers and useful berries. One of his treasures is a plant that will make a hedge so dense that it can be cut almost as thin as a fence and will stay green part of the year. Mr. Wilson has traveled the world over and has been absent several years.
