

AS BUILT IN A DAY
REVIVAL TABERNACLE
WORK OF 100 PAIRS OF HANDS
Men and Women Lend
Cheerful Assistance in Preparing
Meeting Place.
When Saturday's sun rose in brilliant radiance over the Cascades' jagged edges it looked down upon a field of little fields—yellowed with buttercup. When the majestic orb of day traced its way across 180 degrees of space, and its last slanting rays had penetrated the shadows, the butters had been trodden under foot and they stood in a day by 100 pairs of hands. Like Jonah's gourd or the world was sudden, and it loomed over the surrounding objects like a star of Lebanon. Rising to a height of 30 feet and enclosing a floor of 6000 square feet, or nearly a quarter of a city block, it is an excellent example of what unity of purpose can accomplish.
With the beginning of the morning work 100 men were on hand with axes, hammers and squares, and the first of the air resounded with the sounds of their labors. Superintended by Evangelist Moss, assisted by the Reverend Leon L. Myers, construction was carried on speedily and without any confusion. It is almost without exception that so large a number of men could do so much without previous training.
Practically finished.
In comparison, little remained to be done when quitting time came Saturday night. The remainder of the interior fittings were put in Monday, on receipt of a shipment of pressed material, the roof will be made waterproof.
Evangelist Moss was surprised and delighted with the result and said that he was highly encouraged thereat, as he had had done in one day what took two days to accomplish in the region town in which they had erected a similar building.
The men are not due all the credit, however, and naturally, for the work of the church were out in full force and spread such a noisy demonstration that the like for quantity of casement has perhaps never been added in this city. After dinner, the dishes had been washed and put away, the fair co-laborers all set out to the new building, and just as they could do, each took hammer and drove a nail into the work. Strange to say, of all the nails thus pelted, not one was lost or failed to sink to its head in soft fir.
Informal Banquet.
The luncheon was enlivened by informal talks from a number of others, who were introduced by the Reverend Leon L. Myers in the capacity of master of ceremonies, and Mrs. J. R. Craven were guests, and the mayor responded to a toast. Other speakers were Hon. G. Meyer, R. L. Dashiell and Hugh Eck.
During the afternoon, when the sun was the hottest and the work was hardest, every body was served, through the courtesy of Charles Lane, lemonade, and at the same time the diaphanous of doughnuts and cake were passed around and welcomed.

WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE
Mrs. Nellie Maude Todhunter, of Dallas, Takes Carbolic Acid.
Mrs. Nellie Maude Todhunter, aged 31 years, committed suicide at her home at 215 Levea street in this city, Sunday evening, by drinking carbolic acid, while in a mood of despondency, caused by continued ill health.
In company with her husband and children she had been taking an outing in the city park, and had given no intimation of the mental stress that she must have been laboring under at the time. The family returned home about 4:30 p. m., and she retired to rest. About 6 o'clock Mrs. G. W. Todhunter called to make a short visit, and when Mr. Todhunter went to summon his wife he found her lying across the bed, after having just taken the poison. She was conscious for some time later and answered questions by nodding or shaking her head, but she did not speak. Dr. W. S. Carey was immediately sent for, but it was too late to save her. She had taken about three teaspoonfuls of the acid, and death came to relieve her sufferings in about 45 minutes after it had passed her lips.
Besides her husband, M. J. Todhunter, who is employed in the sawmill here, she leaves two children—a boy aged six and a girl aged seven years. She had lost two children, and her grief for them, together with the effects of a long period of sickness, had robbed her of a desire to live.
She was born in Independence and was married in Salem, August 4, 1901. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Roberts, who are now residents of Salt Creek. Most of her life had been spent in this county, with the exception of four years in Tillamook County. She leaves many relatives in this part of the valley. Mrs. Herman Leonard, of Buell, and Miss Loretta and Miss Tina Roberts, of Salt Creek, are her sisters, and she has two brothers—Ralph H. Roberts of Tillamook, and Leo Roberts, of Salt Creek.
Mrs. Todhunter was a member of the Christian Church, and the funeral services were conducted in that church here this afternoon at 3 p. m., by the Reverend Leon L. Myers, after which the body was buried in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.
SCHOOL BONDS VOTED DOWN
Electorate Defeat Project By Majority of 61 at Special Election.
The proposition to vote \$20,000 school bonds by the Dallas district for the purpose of buying property owned by LaCreole Academy, which it was intended to use for the benefit of the public schools of the city met defeat Monday afternoon by a vote of 183 against, to 122 for, or by a majority of 61. A special election to decide the matter was held Monday afternoon in the council chamber of the city hall, the polls being open from 1 to 4 p. m.
The total vote cast was a large one. Many women taxpayers availed themselves of the opportunity to enjoy the infrequent privilege of the ballot, and they formed about one-fourth of the whole number of electors. As far as could be judged their preferences in the matter were proportionate to the general result shown by the final count.
One cynical growl—presumably a bachelor—was heard to remark that during the afternoon he had observed husbands and wives going to the polls who had not been seen together on the streets for twenty years, and that this pleasing spectacle had thoroughly converted him to the cause of woman suffrage.
