

EIGHTH GRADE WINNERS
NINETY-EIGHT PASS OUT OF TOTAL OF 182 APPLICANTS.
Pupils Did as Well as Those of Other Counties in Recent Examinations.
There were 182 applicants and 68 of them passed, making a percentage of 37.36 that were successful. 79 of the pupils were from this county and only one or two subjects, and they will be allowed to write on those subjects in the June examination.
"Every pupil who wrote in the last examination and did not pass ought to be in the June examination," says Superintendent Seymour.
Comparing the work in this county with the reports from other parts of the state the pupils have done as well as the best, those in the majority of the counties.
