

DEAD ANSWERS ROLL
OF INDIAN WAR VETERANS
DIMMED BY TEARS.

Miss Bennett Pictures Pathetic
Scene at Recent Reunion Here
in Portland.

The following introductory descrip-
tion of the opening of the annual re-
union of the Indian War Veterans in
Portland last Tuesday, is from the
pen of Addison Bennett, of "Habit-
tude," now a special writer on
Oregonian, and contains a dash of
human interest that the average re-
porter overlooks in the shuffle of red
tape and routine.

When the grand chaplain of the
Indian War Veterans lifted his voice
yesterday morning to invoke a blessing
on all of those absent and present,
his voice came as if through
the years, and comrades, who had
not met in the past year, were
brought back to the present by the
recalling of the past.

Major Simon, himself a pio-
neer of 1857, extended the welcome
of the city which they had
grown from three or four log
cabins to the Portland of today, a city
which had made possible by their
deeds. And it is but justice
to say that the veterans felt the work-
ing of words at such a time and in
such a cause, for the pioneers, par-
ticularly those who bore arms in the
early days, need no welcome to a city
which is all their own.

Death Answers Rollcall.

And then the roll of officers was
read, and to the first two names
came the answer, "Dead." How was it
that at that moment something seem-
ingly so simple as the reading of the
names of the departed, should have
done it? It happened that so many
names were needed, that the silence
of the silence of death? "Dead,"
said W. Scott, the vice commander,
T. V. B. Embree, the command-
er, have laid down their arms
on the far shore, where they wait
for the coming of those who are
left, but who will so soon join
them.

Presently the secretary read a
list of financial report, showing the
wealth of the order—nearly \$40,
000. What were the chief expenses of
the year? Flowers for the dead!
And anything but more appropriate
to decorate the homes left vacant
the graves newly occupied, by
dead comrades, comrades whose
names will ever remain on the
roll of our state as men great in
that greater, far greater, in peace,
who had so much to do with
winning the Oregon country part and
all of the greatest country on
the continent.

Tears Are Shed.

Smiles and cheers and tears,
smiles at the thought of being
renewed old bonds of
friendship and love, cheers for the
val of their comrades, tears
of valor, for those vacant chairs
the room, for those vacant
chairs in so many homes throughout
the great Northwest! And why tears?
They were not tears of pain, but
tears of joy, knowing that their
comrades are at rest, that they have
on another armor to wear
without let or hindrance.

In the business meeting the ques-

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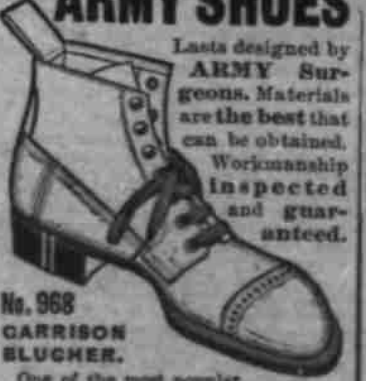
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
