

PIONEERS IN REUNION

ANNUAL PICNIC AND CELEBRATION BEING WAS A SUCCESS.

Good Weather and Good Program Furnish Enjoyment For Large Attendance.

An ideal day, a large attendance, abundance of sports, good speaking and charming music made the Pioneer picnic an occasion of wholesome enjoyment that will linger long in the memories of those who held reunion once more with old-time friends and neighbors last Saturday. Not many of the pioneers were there—the ranks are thinning—and it may be that it is the last Pioneer picnic to be held in this county, as there is a sentiment now that the burden of commemorating the achievements of the early days, and of honoring those who performed them, should be shifted to the younger and stronger shoulders of the native sons and daughters.

The morning exercises opened at the park with music by the Dallas band, and invocation by Rev. C. P. Miller. After the singing of "The Old Settlers' Home" by the choir, J. H. Sawyer, of Monmouth, president of the day, delivered the address of welcome, which was listened to with close and appreciative attention.

Two Kinds of Courage.

Following a selection by the Dallas band, President J. H. Ackerman, of Monmouth Normal School, gave an annual address, brief and appropriate, and warmly received. He emphasized the difference between the "courage of the crisis," and the "courage of the commonplace," and exhorted the audience to a life of heroic deeds. A special feature of the program was the rendition of a funeral dirge, entitled "In Memory of the Oregon Pioneer," which was added by Director U. S. Grant.

"ALERTS" COME BACK

"PIONEERS" LOSE SATURDAY'S GAME BY SCORE OF 10 TO 41.

Dallas Greys Win Over Grand Ronde Indians and Defeat Hopewell Sunday.

It was a great game. In four acts, of two scenes each, the "Alerts" fanned the champions of the Willamette Valley; of other days, "came back" and effaced the "Pioneers" at the rate of 11 to 10, last Saturday.

It was a fine game. Old battle-scarred veterans of the diamond, rejuvenated and with the blood of the fray still in their veins, came forth in canvas shoes and ambled over the line marks with a grace that was fair to see. Some few of them struck the ball, but most of them were content with striking an attitude. Numerous errors were allowed. They were due to the peculiarity of the ball in use, which was red-hot when they went to pick it up, and then anon froze to their hands when they tried to throw it. Brained as to fingers, sore as to feet, and stiff as to joints, the old boys on both sides retired in a blaze of glory, and the drug stores did an extra business until closing time Saturday night, dispensing arnica, witch hazel, Saint Shakeup's Lizard Oil, and other soothing applications.

The Pioneers were first at bat. W. C. Miller was the first man up and was passed to first on balls, and scored the first run.

County Clerk Smith created intense excitement by knocking a two-bagger and Sheriff Grant went out on first. The second spasm of the first agony was opened by John Purley, who lined out a good one, right into Deputy Assessor Ayres' hands. Postmaster C. G. Coad then appeared at the plate with a bat in his hands, prepared to knock one over into Ward Two of Smithfield. The ball left the pitcher's hand and came rushing slowly toward him. With one mighty swing he swung, and—on his knees. When he recovered from his astonishment he arose and mailed one out in the direction of Perrydale and took the rural route for second. And the contest was on.

OLDEST TWINS VISIT CITY

The Haines Brothers Spend Saturday With the Campbell Brothers.

The oldest pair of twins in Oregon were in Dallas Saturday, and visited the second oldest pair of twins in Oregon, and galled at Cherrington's studio and were photographed. The couple entitled to the first distinction was J. A. Haines, of Monmouth, and W. W. Haines, of Eugene, aged 53 years. Their hosts while here were J. M. Campbell and T. J. Campbell, who are 77 years old. The visitors had heard of the Campbell brothers, of Dallas, and wrote a letter asking them to meet the Haines in Portland. Not finding them there, the latter came up to Dallas to meet them to meet the Haines in Portland.

A glance over the chief events in the lives of the two couples shows several interesting and coincidental facts, while from the photograph just taken it would be hard for one to believe that they were not all brothers of one family, so great is the resemblance among the four.

The Haines brothers were born in Tazewell County, Illinois, August 3, 1835. The Campbells were born in Morgan County, Illinois, October 8, 1833, or five years later.

The Campbells came to Oregon across the plains in 1851. The Haines came to the state in the same manner in 1853.

J. M. Campbell served in the Yakima Indian war, as did W. W. Haines. While the Haines have the advantage of the greater age, the Dallas twins assert that they were the smallest at birth, their combined weight being only 6 pounds. T. J. Campbell weighed 2 1/2 pounds, and J. M. Campbell only 3 1/2.

Handsomeness destroyed.

Mrs. Susan McKinney Returns From Visit While Dwelling Burns.

As Mrs. Susan McKinney stepped off the train Saturday evening on her return from a pleasant visit to Albany, the fire bell was summoning the department to fight the flames that were consuming her handsome home on the northwest corner of Ash and Jefferson streets. Within 20 minutes, the fire had made a mere shell of the rear portion of the building and had injured the upper part of the two-story front. With the exception of a piano and the furniture from the parlor, but little was saved. There was no insurance, and the loss will fall heavily upon the owner, who is a widow.

It is thought that the fire started from a defective flue in the kitchen. Mrs. S. A. Cox, sister-in-law of Mrs. McKinney, had been ironing, and while sitting on the front porch heard the crackling of fire, that called her attention to the kitchen, where the flames had broken out. The alarm was given and the firemen and apparatus were quickly at work.

The house had just been painted, a new bathroom equipped, and numerous interior improvements were but recently made.

It was reported that subscription papers tendering assistance to Mrs. McKinney were circulated, but the amounts received could not be learned. The music class of the Christian Church bible school contributed \$20 last Sunday. Mrs. McKinney was taken care of by the neighbors, and she feels under many obligations to them for their generous kindness. The house will be rebuilt as soon as possible.
