NOT ALL UNTRUTH.

Burton J. Hendrick's article on "The Origin of the Initiative, Referendum and Recall in Oregon," published in a recent number of McClure's Magazine, is receiving some sturdy whacks from the press of Oregon for the amount of untruth and misrepresentation it contains. Even Mr. U'Ren, who is lauded to the skies in the article, takes pains to deny the correctness of many of the assertions made by the writer. After a careful reading of the entire story the Observer is able to find but one correct statement; that is to say, but one statement that would seem absolutely beyond dispute or contradiction. This is a quotation purporting to have been taken from a pamphlet issued by Senator Jonathan Bourne in 1906, when Jonathan was running for the office he now holds. "Those who were in the Bourne headquarters almost every day," reads this quotation, "say that Mr. Bourne rented all the available rooms in the Eldridge block, in Salem, for the night, and a waiter, fitted up a kitchen and dining room and entertained his friends as he would if they were guests at his own home. Every visitor who came was royally entertained." We think the "royalty" of the entertainment in the Eldridge block has never been questioned by any person at all familiar with what was going on there during the famous hold-up session of the Oregon Legislature. It seems to be the general belief in Oregon that here was one session of the Legislature where good, old farmer members were really and truly provided with "all the comforts of a home."

Chicago's roll of death Tuesday was 23. Forces seemed to suffer more than their masters.

Despite cooling breeze which sprang in over night, 20 deaths were recorded in New York. Philadelphia had nine and Pittsburgh 11, and in all these cities there were hundreds of prostrations of a serious character. In the death lists directly to the heat an account is taken of babies who are dying by scores. The country at large reports an aggregate of more than 200 deaths for the day, which properly belong to the heat casualties, as the victims were slain while trying to escape from the torridity.

ANNOUNCE HATCHERY PLANS

Young Fry to Be Nursed at Central Stations Hereafter.

PENDLETON, Or., July 4.—A new system for the fish hatcheries of the state was announced this morning by Chairman C. K. Cranston, of the Oregon Fish and Game Commission, before he left for Portland to join State Game Warden Finley, Master Fish Warden Clanton and Superintendent of Hatcheries Wisner on a tour to inspect present hatcheries and arrange for the installation of others.

According to Mr. Cranston, it is the purpose of the commission to liberate annually millions of trout and salmon fry in the streams of the state, where thousands are liberated now. The commission also proposes to make it possible for thousands of these young fish to come to maturity where very few do under the present system.

One or more central hatcheries will be established where the fish eggs will be collected in great quantities. These stations will be located at points where it is possible to get the largest number of adult fish for hatchery purposes. Very probably one for trout will be built on Spring Creek, in Klamath county.

The eggs will be "sieved" at the stations where they are taken, and then will be shipped to the branch hatcheries throughout the state for further development. Each of these will be equipped with expensive nursery ponds. Instead of liberating the fish when not more than an inch in length, allowing them to fall easy prey to larger fish or victims of varying degrees of temperature in the water, they will be kept and nursed until they are three or four inches long, and well able to take care of themselves.

Fifty million trout fry annually for the streams of Oregon is the mark which the commission hopes to attain by next year, and it is possible that this number will be increased as the years go by. By this system it is hoped to make Oregon the best trout fishing state in the Union.
