TEAM AND BARN DESTROYED
 J. W. Lee suffers severe loss from fire last Tuesday night. Within an hour after J. W. Lee and family returned from the Fourth of July celebration at Falls City, last Tuesday night, about 10:30, his barn, one mile north of Bridgeport, was in flames and his \$300 team was burned to death in their stalls. In addition the flames destroyed a blacksmith shop, granary, wagon, buggy, four sets of harness, a ton and a half of hay and a quantity of grain, and a miscellaneous collection of farming implements, including a mower and rake. The barn was 20 by 24 in size, with three large sheds attached, and was a complete loss.

CLUB FAVORS FAIR EXHIBIT
 Will be represented at Albany Joint Meeting Next Tuesday.
 At the regular meeting of the Dallas Commercial Club, held in the court house last Wednesday evening, consideration was given the matter of representation at the Albany meeting next Tuesday, for the purpose of organizing the commercial bodies of Yamhill, Polk, Marion, Benton, Linn and Lane Counties, in order to make a collective exhibit of resources at the coming State Fair at Salem, and the members of the executive committee were appointed delegates for that purpose. President Muir and Secretary Toose being included. Alternates were appointed as follows: U. S. Lounsbury, D. M. Metzger, J. B. Crovren, Edwin Jacobson, Tracy Staats, W. A. Arves, A. E. Thompson.
 The question will be taken up before the County Court this morning to determine how much money will be appropriated for the exhibit to be made by Polk County. The commercial clubs of Independence, Monmouth and Falls City have been invited to be present, as have fruit growers and other agricultural producers.
 Friday, July 14, is to be "clean-up day" in Dallas, and Mayor J. R. Craven will call on all good citizens and urge them to clean up their premises at that time. Great and hard yards will be given a scrubbing, and everything will be put in shipshape. The law requires that "chinese lettuces" and thistles be removed, and the fact will be impressed on property owners. President Muir of the Commercial Club will appoint a committee of 10 women to look after the assistance in general supervision and all-round houseing.
 To replace the secret committee of the Merchants' Protective Association, now disbanded, a similar committee will be maintained by the Commercial Club hereafter, and all solicitors who wish to canvass the city will be required to get the permission of that committee, through the secretary. Any member of the club who patronizes an unauthorized solicitor, may have his membership revoked as a penalty. The ruling will not interfere with church and similar solicitations. The need of advertising matter was discussed, and the executive committee was urged to get busy in supplying the need.

PETITIONS ARE CONSIDERED
 County Commissioners Hold Short Session of Court For July

The July term of County Commissioners' Court was held Wednesday, and in addition to auditing the usual bills, business was transacted as follows:

In the matter of the petition of Ben Thompson et al, for a change in the Canyon road in road district No. 15, petition filed; remonstrance having more signatures than the petition, it is ordered that the petition be dismissed.

In the petition of H. M. Ebbert et al, to establish a road in Districts 13 and 20, report of viewers read first time; continued for second reading and further hearing, to July 12, at 9 a. m.

In the matter of the purchase of right of way of J. F. Ulrich for county road 10 feet wide for \$200. It is ordered that the deed for such right of way, executed by J. F. Ulrich et ux, to Polk County be accepted; that said deed be recorded by the County Clerk and that the claim for \$200 for damages therefor be allowed in full.

FOREIGN LABORERS TABOO
 Salem Citizens Roused by Acts of Alien Workmen.

SALEM, July 4.—Efforts are being made by some of the city councilmen to rid the city of the foreigners, especially the large number of Greeks and Italians who are employed on city street improvement work. Through the city council an endeavor is being made to require that hereafter all of the city contracts be so awarded that only American labor may be hired by the contractors.

A small army of these men is at work here and they have created considerable trouble from time to time. They live in tents on the edge of the city, and developments in the Tschudi family, near there, recently, when a Greek was captured in an attempt to entice one of the small girls of the family away from home, have caused some apprehension in that neighborhood.
