Poultry Fittings.

Keep the egg record in every day.
If you skip one day even the rest will
be a guess, and guessing isn't business.

Trap nests are not expensive, but
they are very essential to the well di-
rected poultry farm. By using trap
nests you can keep a record of the
eggs.

The profit in poultry raising for
market lies in hatching early, pushing
the chickens forward as rapidly as
possible and marketing them early in
the season.

It will not do to allow ducks to share
the common lot of poultry in general—
not that they require more attention,
but rather a different manner of
handling and feeding.

Many people are realizing the profit
in raising heavy geese, for they are
worth more a pound than the lighter
breeds, and every year there is more
demand for the Toulouse.

A hen should be fed some grain that
she doesn't have to scratch for. Al-
though exercise is necessary to keep
her in good health, she needs time to
rest and dust herself in the middle of
the day.

Treatment for roup: One ounce per-
centage of potassium to three pints of
water for submerging the head. For
drinking purposes dilute one pint of
the above mixture in three or four
pints of water.

Onions chopped fine and mixed with
the hen's food occasionally will pro-
mote health. Onions are a great pou-
ltry tonic, and they are preferred by
fowls old and young. Fat hatched
chicks tumble over one another to get
their feed when onions are mixed
with it.

We heard the other day of a faithful
fellow who got the better of a balky
horse by hopping out of the rig and
pretending to adjust something about
the harness. By the time he had tied
and untied the rump strap or mockey-
ed with the tug or bridle a bit and got
back into his seat the horse was ready
to start on. The writer has had equal-
ly good results while cultivating with
horses inclined to balk by bucking
them up a few steps and then starting
about. But all schemes fail at times,
and, like others, we have sat for a good
half hour, with the thermometer regis-
tering 100 degrees F. in the shade in
the vicinity of our rear collar button,
waiting for Tom to get over a balky
streak. It takes a stack of patience,
much philosophy and all or more re-
ligion than a fellow can muster to
keep sweet tempered when he has one
of the ornery critters on his hands.

Time was when cows needed their
horns for self protection, but under
modern domestic conditions they are
useless and often dangerous append-
ages. The best and easiest method of
dehorning is by the application of
some caustic agent to the growth of the
horns when the calf is a few days old.
After the horns have got a good start
the job must be done by saw or clip-
pers. Many a dairyman hesitates to
dehorn his cows because of the harm-
ful effect he thinks it will have in
reducing their milk flow. However, this
is likely to be overestimated. A test
made at the Kansas Agricultural col-
lege in a herd of twelve cows with a
view to determining the shrinkage as
a result of dehorning showed that in
the five days following the operation it
gave 1,142.5 pounds of milk, while in
the five days following it gave 1,007
pounds, or a total shrinkage for the
twelve cows of 40.5 pounds. This
amounts to sixty-six one-hundredths
of a pound of milk per cow each day,
or about half a pint. On the fifth day
after dehorning all except two of the
cows were giving as much milk, and
a few more than they did the day be-
fore their horns were removed.

Thanks to recent alertness and ac-
tivity on the part of the postal author-

GAME WILL BE PROPAGATED

State Warden Finley, Recently Ap-
pointed, Announces New Policy.

"The policy of the State Game War-
den, in the past," said William L.
Finley, recently appointed to that po-
sition, "has been characterized very
largely by protecting the belief has
been general that Oregon has enough
game and that its protection is all that
is necessary. As a matter of fact,
game cannot be made abundant by
making and enforcing laws. We have
not enough game, and in spite of
protecting what we have, we observe
that there is less and less every year.
It is absolutely necessary to have the
influence of the people and the farm-
ers in particular, back of the move-
ment, but, above all, the infusion of
new blood, meaning the propagation
of game, as well as its protection.

"It will be one of the policies of
the present warden to continue the
work of protection with vigor and an
efficient force of deputy wardens.
Another and equally as important a
feature will be the propagation of
game. The National government is
doing valuable work in restocking the
streams of the state with salmon,
while the propagation of trout is left
largely to the state. The establish-
ment of trout hatcheries will be one
of our first efforts. Along this line,
it is well to state that one change in
the way of the state to keep and feed
trout until they are 2 1/2 inches long,
and able to protect themselves, in-
stead of releasing them when they are
an inch in length. As far as the funds
collected from anglers' licenses will
permit, this work of hatching trout
will be prosecuted.

"In the line of game, we intend to
introduce 250 pair of Chinese pheas-
ants, direct from China, for the new
blood. This will be done while the
two years' closed season is in force.
In addition to protecting those we al-
ready have, we will propagate new
birds. We are already in negotiation
with parties to furnish 100 pair of
Reeves pheasants, to be released on
reservations that will be established
from time to time."
