A VALUABLE LADDER.

Every Fruit Grower Can Make It at Home and Prove Its Worth.

Here is shown a model of an ideal light safety ladder for fruit growers that can be easily made at home at little or no cost.

Take 1 1/2 by 3 inch white pine clear of flaws for the sides and 1 by 3 squares for steps. As they are better to stand on than round ones. Nail blocks for them to rest on, and to keep the sides from spreading put a small rod under every third step, or wire will do. Double and twist it.

Take a solid piece four feet long for the "outlet." Bolt this with two one-half inch bolts, with wedges to make it solid. This makes a much lighter and handier ladder than the old straight one.

You put the outlet in the fork of a limb, and there is no slipping or turning or knocking the fruit off.

Make several ladders of different lengths to suit your trees.

A TREE THAT OWNS ITSELF.

Dairy Doings.
Don't feed out all the clover to the cows. Have a nice lot for the sheep. They will get as much good out of it as any animal on the farm.
The bull's dam is a big factor in the success of his progeny. Get a bull from a large producing cow, and the more such cows in his pedigree the better.
A cow which is gentle and which has never been known to kick will soon learn to kick if she is beaten. She will treat you pretty much as you treat her.
The man who cannot milk without abusing cows has no business in the cow stable. A kick or blow will retard the secretion of milk and may injure the cow for time to come.
Small, undersized heifers should not be bred too early. It is cheaper to have vigor and size at a greater expense of feed, so as to get the heifer into the herd at twenty-four or twenty-seven months.
No farmer would think of putting his family on a ration of bread alone, or even bread and potatoes, for one day, yet we see many a man compelling his dumb, helpless animals to eat a single roughage ration for months at a time.
Governor Hoad once said on the color question: "If grass had produced green butter the oleomargarine people would be coloring their product green. It has been said where substitution is possible fair competition is impossible. The dairy interests of the country do not object to the selling of oleomargarine as oleomargarine; it is not jealous of its competition, but coloring the stuff yellow permits fraud, does away with competition. Dairymen are not trying to annihilate oleomargarine, but the fraud it has created."

We heard the other day of a tactful fellow who got the better of a balky horse by hopping out of the rig and pretending to adjust something about the harness. By the time he had tied and untied the rump strap or monkeyed with the tug on behind a bit and got back into his seat the horse was ready to start on. The writer has had equally good results while cultivating with horses inclined to balk by backing them up a few steps and then starting ahead. But all schemes fail at times, and, like others, we have sat for a good half hour, with the thermometer registering 110 degrees F. in the shade, in the vicinity of our rear collar button, waiting for Tom to get over a balky streak. It takes a stack of patience, much philosophy and all or more religion than a fellow can muster to keep sweet tempered when he has one of the ornery critters on his hands.

Time was when cows needed their horns for self protection, but under modern domestic conditions they are useless and often dangerous appendages. The best and safest method of deborning is by the application of some caustic potash to the germ of the horns when the calf is a few days old. After the horns have a good start the job must be done by saw or clipper. Many a dairyman hesitates to deborn his cows because of the harmful effect he thinks it will have in reducing their milk flow. However, this is likely to be overestimated. A test made at the Kansas Agricultural college in a herd of twelve cows with a view to determining the shrinkage as a result of deborning showed that in the five days prior to the operation it gave 1,142.5 pounds of milk, while in the five days following it gave 1,100.7 pounds, or a total shrinkage for the twelve cows of 40.8 pounds. This amounts to sixty-nine one-hundredths of a pound of milk per cow each day, or about half a pint. On the fifth day after deborning all except two of the cows were giving as much milk, and a few more than they did the day before their horns were removed.

Thanks to recent alertness and activity on the part of the postal service, a whole lot of grafters who have been using the mails to misrepresent and defraud have been run in earth and in many cases have not only had to pay heavy fines, but many of them are now doing time in federal prisons. From most points of view rats are an all around nuisance, but when telephone linesmen lay wires in underground conduits they come in handy. A light cord is fastened around a rat's neck, and it is released at the mouth of the conduit. Instinctively it runs through to the other end. Here it is caught and the end of the string is secured. This is used to pull a wire through, and this in turn is pulled through the cable containing many wires.

Poultry Platings.
Keep the egg record up every day. If you skip one day even the best will be a guess, and guessing isn't business. They need not be so expensive, but they are very essential to the well directed poultry farm. By using rat traps you can keep a record of the eggs.

The profit in poultry raising for market lies in hatching early, pushing the chickens forward as rapidly as possible and marketing them early in the season.

It will not do to allow ducks to share the common lot of poultry in general—not that they require more attention, but rather a different manner of handling and feeding.

Many people are realizing the profit in raising heavy geese, as they are worth more a pound than the lighter breeds, and every year there is more demand for the Toulouse.

A hen should be fed some grain that she doesn't have to scratch for. Although exercise is necessary to keep her in good health, she needs time to rest and dust herself in the middle of the day.

Treatment for roup: One ounce per quart of water for three days of water for submerging the head or drinking purposes dilute one pint of the above mixture in three or four pints of water.

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Dairy Notes.
The capacity of a dairy cow is worthless if she does not have material with which to work.
The blood may supply the milk, but unless it in turn is supplied by the food there can be no milk.
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Fattening Cattle.
Investigation by the Missouri experiment station shows that cattle fattened on blue grass pasture will make double the gain on the same grain for the first three months of the pasture season as compared with the investigations of the feeding period. The investigation covered five years and in the course of the feeding of 322 cattle divided into thirty-six lots, being, as is said, the largest and most complete investigation of this subject ever made in this country.

Handling the Heifer.
Be careful about the early training of the dairy cow. The first season of freshening milk the heifer for ten or eleven months to encourage the inclination to long milking periods in succeeding seasons. A young cow is more liable to injuries of the udder by high feeding before or soon after calving than an older cow. And some cows are more susceptible to udder trouble than others and have to be fed moderately before and after the calf arrives.
