HIGHER PRICE IN HOPS DUE

California Offers of 26 1/2 Cents Made, With No Takers.

Another uplift in hop prices is due, predicts the commercial editor of the Oregonian. According to a wire from California, Proctor has orders in Sonoma at 26 1/2 cents, but has closed no business as yet. There is little doubt the California market will be established at this figure in the coming week, and the Oregon market will necessarily follow.

No business in spot hops or in contracts has been reported locally for several days. In California Flint contracted with Rooney for 100 hales of Sacramentos at 25 cents.

The maximum estimate of the California crop is now 70,000 hales, and it is said on the authority of a reliable Santa Rosa dealer that 55,000 hales have been contracted for or are controlled by dealers. Red spider has appeared in the Sacramento section, but the attack is not yet considered serious.

The Oregon crop is in very good shape. The hot weather of the past week has killed off most of the vermin. The larger growers have been spraying and a fine quality of product is almost assured. There is a diversity of opinion as to the size of the yield, but it is safe to say it will equal last year's, or about 93,000 hales. Conditions in Washington are similar to those in Oregon, and the crop of that state is estimated at 23,000 hales.

It is now generally conceded that New York State will fall short of last year's output of 40,000 hales by probably 5,000 hales.

Comings and Goings as Told by Our Exchanges.

Dr. C. C. Poling, of Dallas, was the guest of friends in Corvallis yesterday, on his way to Summit on a business mission.—Corvallis Gazette-Times.

Want Extra Session.
MEDFORD, Or., July 18.—Telegrams will be sent from many towns in the state to Governor West, urging a special session of the Legislature to consider necessary legislation for good roads, next Thursday. The commercial clubs and State Grange will join hands in the movement. The plan originated here from a desire to bond Jackson County for \$1,000,000 the money to be spent in improving the highways of the county. Attempts have been made to call a special election instead and have the people vote warrants, but they have failed. It is understood here that the Portland Chamber of Commerce and commercial bodies of virtually all progressive cities in the state are backing the good roads movement.

Will Fly for Purs.
SALEM, July 18.—D. D. Huddlestone and Ben Taylor, local amateur aviators, have made people of Salem a proposition to sail over the city for a purse of \$500. If they fail to buzz around the dome of the capitol they will ask no pay. Believing that no city of the Northwest has had a home-built airship fly over it, these builders feel the Salem people, from an advertising point of view, encourage their venture. The best flight thus far which the aviators claim to have made was of two miles, in which they say they raised the machine several times to a height of 600 feet. Since the wreck of July 4, the machine has been completely repaired and a heavier propeller put on.

Pure Water Wanted.
SALEM, July 18.—At a meeting held by the state board yesterday afternoon it was decided to arrange for a pure water system at the Inmate Asylum. A \$10,000 appropriation was set aside by the last Legislature for the purpose of sinking wells, from which to draw water for domestic purposes at the state institutions, and the board plans to install the new system at once. The Inmate Asylum and the penitentiary are supplied with drinking water from Mill Creek, which is considered unfit for domestic use.

POOR FOOD INJURES HEALTH

Claim Holder of Silets Suffers From Using Mouldy Flour.

FALLS CITY, July 18.—James Forbes, a claim holder in the Siletz Basin, is lying in the hospital here in a precarious condition. His claim is 20 miles west of this place and four miles from the roadway. Last December, when he started from here to his claim, after he left the main road for the four-mile walk through the woods to his claim, he had no regular trail to follow and he followed blazes on trees as a guide.

He wandered from his course and was lost in the woods for five days, when he found a deserted cabin. Here he found a can of musty flour, having evidently been there for a long time. He used some of the flour for pancakes and lived on them for two days before help came and he was enabled to reach his own claim. The musty flour caused stomach trouble and he grew steadily weaker until now he is here under the care of physicians, who fear that his ailment is so to preclude recovery.

DROWNED NEAR EOLA RAPIDS

Employee on Government Dredge Knocked Overboard Into River.

SALEM, July 18.—Ralph E. Kennedy, an employee on the Government dredge Champeau, was drowned in the Willamette River, four miles south of Salem, yesterday afternoon, while assisting in transferring a scow from the upper river to the dredge below the Eola Rapids. Kennedy's wife stood on the deck of the dredge at the time of the accident, and the master of the boat, Captain Moss, also witnessed the man's plunge to death in the swift waters. Captain Moss was powerless to assist Kennedy on account of the distance between him and the scow, and could do nothing but give what assistance he could to the grief-stricken wife. Although men worked late last night dragging the river for the body, nothing could be accomplished, and it is believed it is lodged in the rocks somewhere at the foot of the rapids.
