

TWO YOUNG MEN ARRESTED

Each Tried on Charge of Having Defrauded Dallas People.

Sheriff J. M. Grant returned from Salem late Monday night with two prisoners, both young men. One of them has been at the Gail Hotel in Dallas for several days lately, and was arrested in Albany on a charge of being arrested at the hotel as J. C. Cochran, and introduced himself as having been private secretary to United States Senator Bailey, of Texas, and also claimed to have been a captain in the Texas rangers. He was taken before justice of the Peace Hardy Holman this morning, but was discharged for lack of evidence. He was immediately re-arrested on a charge of obtaining money by impersonating another. He is charged with having represented himself as agent of the Oregon Nursery company, and sold an alleged bill of goods for \$113 to Mr. Goetz, living near Dallas, the check later being cashed by J. C. Shultz, proprietor of the Pioneer saloon. Cochran will be given a hearing next Thursday at 1 o'clock.

The other prisoner brought over by the sheriff was Chester Willard, who has been wanted in Dallas since last May, when it is claimed he hired a horse from E. W. Fuller's livery stable, rode over to Salem and left it there, where Mr. Fuller later recovered the animal. Nothing was heard of Willard until his return to Salem a few days ago. He pleaded guilty before Justice Holman this morning, for justice to his youth was let off on a fine of \$30 and costs, which he will have the opportunity of working out.
