MONEY IN STRAWBERRIES.

You Can Pick Them Away Into October if Planted Right.

That the strawberries are money makers is evidenced from this story from C. E. Pursell of Illinois, published in the Farmer.

He says: "Grow them from plants set in the spring in rows four feet apart and two to three feet apart in the row. They should be kept cultivated and hoed all through the season until fall, when, if they do well, you should have a row fifteen to twenty inches wide.

"The ground should be got in as good shape as possible before starting to mark the rows. If the plot is in shape so you can check them so much the better. It saves quite a bit of hoeing. You can cross cultivate them about twice before they start to throw out many runners. They need hoeing four or five times during the summer and should be cultivated every week or so to keep the ground from crusting over and to keep down the weeds. Work until the plants quit growing in the fall. Then they are

munched with straw, about three or four loads to the acre, any time after they have finished growing until winter sets in.

"We plant berries in the early fall, about ten inches apart and put the rows three to five and a half feet apart because they do not throw out many runners. We begin picking them about February and March and ship in pint boxes in place of quarts. In Florida they are set out in double rows about ten inches apart, with about three feet between every two rows, which they keep cultivated. The soil is nothing but sand, and they manage to keep them out of the sand. I was there in January this year and saw some of them still covered, and they were shipping ripe berries at the same time, getting 50 cents per quart at the station. They ship in thirty-two and sixty-four quart refrigerators. If needed and when empty they are returned to the shipper.

"The profit in growing berries has been very good the last three years, clearing from \$1.25 to \$2 to the acre and making from 150 to 200 cases to the acre. The past was an exceptional year. We had ripe berries through August, September and up to October that were as fine as you ever saw, being mostly Haverland and Clyde. I know of one man who had about twenty-five cases that sold as high as \$6 a case. No one seems to know why they fruited this year the second time. All varieties did not. I had Warfield and Dunlap that I got no berries off the second crop. There were some others who had a few Warfields and Dunlaps, but the Clyde was as heavy on one end of the bed as the first crop, which was extra good this year."

Don't Neglect Table Manners.

No amount of knowledge, wealth and good clothes can compensate for the lack of the simple table manners which you should have learned in your childhood and should, if you have children of your own, teach the youngsters while they are small.

Break off and butter a bit of bread at a time as you want it. Eat quietly, keeping lips closed while chewing. Don't eat hurriedly. Don't begin to eat until the others are served. Don't shovel food on knife blade and scrape off with fork. When food is tender enough, use fork in cutting rather than your knife. For desserts, cakes and salads with fork, if possible. Don't drink tea or coffee from saucer. In using the napkin a man of good breeding leaves his half folded and lays it across his lap. The woman spreads hers over her lap.

Shun everything which looks like a display of greediness. To keep the plate to gobble the food, to drain your glass or your cup, to tip your napkin plate that none of the precious drops may escape you, to swab the gravy from the plate with a bit of bread and to demand a second help before others at the table have fairly begun of their first supply are all manifest evidences of a lack of breeding.

OKDALE MAN WAS FIRST

Marion County Farmer Loses Right To Use Farm Name.

In the press dispatches sent out from Salem comes the information that after using the name "Mountain View Farm" for 21 years, William Eaglin, who has been shipping his peaches and other fruits under the name, made the discovery that there has been another farm named "Mountain View" registered ahead of him in the state, and he will have to desist from using the name hereafter under the new law.

When it came to registering his farm name, Mr. Eaglin was too slow, for John Robinson, a well-known resident of this county, who lives in Oakdale, was the first one to apply for legal authority granting him the exclusive use of the title "Mountain View Farm." Mr. Robinson's home is well named, for from his front door, on a clear day, he has an extensive range of mountains and snow peaks to gaze upon.

THE SELECTION OF GOOD DAIRY COWS

In an address before the Vermont Dairy association Professor Cook of New York said that after an experience of a lifetime he believed the only sure way to tell a good cow is to bring out the series and Babcock test. One cow that came pretty near being eligible for the booby prize had to her credit 500 pounds of butter for the year. Professor Cook mentioned this to show how impossible it is to judge a cow entirely on her looks. As a man looks the dairy cow in the face she should show a good head and a fine eye, not too prominent. The lips should be strong and the nostrils large, with good openings. Strong lips in a dairy cow indicate good digestion and good milk production. The cow should be wide between the front legs and have a good length of body.

Continuing, Professor Cook said: "My experience is that a good dairy cow has good, heavy shoulders, not beefy, for, in fact, there should not be a bit of fat on a dairy cow.

"The ribs should be far apart. The mammary veins do not always indicate what the cow will produce, but they come pretty close. Milk veins should be prominent and many of them. This indicates a good blood circulation. Contrary to the impression of many, there is no milk in the milk veins. They are filled with blood returning from the udder to the heart. I always like large milk veins or openings. I like to see milk veins on the udder.

"The skin of the animal should be loose and snap back when released. Watch out for a thin, papery hide. Such an animal is likely to have poor

digestion and be unable to reproduce herself. I never saw a tide to think if I started back on quick recovery. I do not want a thin, small cow, and do not take much stock in an extra long one. Many make a mistake in feeding cows too heavily before they freshen. They should be placed on a diet two weeks before freshening. It is a terrible shock to the cow when the most food is fed to her from the udder.

As to the cow's udder, much can be told by the texture as to what will be done inside. It is a great mystery to know just why, how and when one cow does remarkably more than another while another does little or nothing.

There seems to be a peculiar functional activity with the udder of some cows to turn out a lot of milk. They have the peculiar ability to take a lot of nourishment from the blood as it flows through the udder. That is why, we urge farmers to select the cow with extra good circulation. If the milk veins are prominent on the abdomen and udder it indicates a good circulation and the probability that a lot of nourishment is being utilized through the udder. A soft, velvety or silky udder is as good an indication as I know of what is going on inside.

Cooking—Feed Does Not Pay.

As a rule, cooking the feed for the cow depreciates the digestibility of the protein. At the Oregon experiment station Dickinson & Bradley found that steaming both vetch and corn silage materially decreased the digestibility. Some starchy feed, like potatoes, often has its digestibility increased by cooking, but the preponderance of testimony is to the effect that it does not pay to cook feed for the dairy cow.

CALIFORNIA PRICE SOARS

Hop Market There Has Reached 30 Cents For New Crop.

The market for new-crop Pacific Coast hops has at last reached 30 cents. That price was paid in California yesterday.

C. C. Donovan, of Santa Rosa, was the buyer, and he secured 600 bales of Sonomas at a price that has not been equaled since the fall of 1904.

The market level has now been established at 30 cents and although that figure has not been paid here the buyers will have to come up to it if they expect to do business. The last purchase of new-crop Oregon hops known to have been made was at 25 1/2 cents. There were offers in the country yesterday morning of 26 1/2 and 27 cents, both in Oregon and Washington, while late in the afternoon 28 and 28 1/2 cents were offered.

Crop reports from the Continent of Europe are coming worse and worse every day. A cable from Frankfurt, Germany, received yesterday, was as follows: "Weather tropical; heat has ready good one-third less than last year." This means an estimate of about 570,000 cwt. for the continent. Other cables from good authorities placed the crop even smaller.

English mail advices dated July 21 said that at that date the drought had been hard on the fugies, but the ramblings stood it better. An early season was anticipated with a short crop of good quality.

Whale at Siletz.

Siletz Bay is the scene of a season of visitors along the coast from Tillamook to Newport, the attraction being a mammoth whale that ran aground there a few days ago. The finny colossus is believed to be the same one that was seen fleeing from a sword fish and thresher about a week ago off Tillamook head. The sperm is said to be the largest ever seen on the Oregon coast. It measures 73 feet in length, 15 feet across the snout and 15 feet across the tail.
