

BAN ON PUBLIC CUP

STATE HEALTH BOARD ORDERS IT ABOLISHED AFTER FIRST.

Travelers and School Children Will Be Required to Carry Individual Cups.

The new regulation of the Oregon State Board of Health, prohibiting the use of public drinking cups in Oregon, goes into effect the first of next month, and will be rigidly enforced. As a sanitary precaution, all cups for the general use on railway trains and in school houses, and other places of a public nature, will be abolished. Travelers will be required to provide themselves with individual cups before they start out on their journey, or else go thirsty, and every school child will be expected to be furnished with a pocket cup by the time school opens this fall.

Through the efforts of the school authorities of Polk, the relegation of the time-honored school-room dipper has been pretty well effected already, so that the order of the board of health will be applicable to but few of the institutions of learning in this county. The new Dallas high school building has been equipped with sanitary fountains of the latest model, and any lingering, lurking germs may just as well go off and commit hara-kari at once as they will not get a look-in under the new system.

Spreads Disease.
The order sending the community cup to the scrap heap reads as follows:

"Whereas, it has been proven beyond doubt that the use of the common drinking cup is responsible for the spread of many infectious and contagious diseases, particularly of such dire diseases as consumption, syphilis, diphtheria and many others, and that

"Whereas, the abolishment of what is known as the common drinking cup would be for the betterment of the public health,

Use Prohibited.
"Therefore be it resolved, by the Oregon State Board of Health, that the use of the common drinking cup on railroad trains, in railroad stations, in the public and private schools, in all the educational institutions of the state of Oregon is hereby prohibited, from and after September 1, 1911.

"That on and after this date, no person or corporation in charge or control of any railroad station or any railroad train, electric car or any public conveyance, or in any public or private school or any state educational institution shall furnish any drinking cup for public use, and no such person or corporation shall permit on said railroad train or station, or on said electric car or at said public or private school or said state educational institution, or on said public conveyance, the use of the common drinking cup."

POLK PEACHES ON DISPLAY

Large Early Hales From Howe's Orchard Shown by F. E. Cook.

Just to show visitors what Polk county can do in the way of raising big peaches, even in an off year, F. E. Cook is displaying in his real estate office window on Court street a sample of the Hale's Early variety which were grown in the famous Howe peach orchard on the north side of a short distance above Dallas. The peaches are extraordinarily large for an early kind, and attract much attention from passers-by. People who think that peaches cannot be successfully raised in this locality should take a look at the display. Men who are familiar with the character of the soil say there are many acres of good peach land lying along the river that in time will be made to bring forth good fruit.

The late crop of peaches in the Howe orchard will begin to ripen up about September 1. The crop will consist principally of Early Crawford, Early Charlottes and Fosters. Owing to the abnormally late spring, the crop will be short this year, and Mr. W. R. Howe says that he does not expect more than a third of the usual yield.

TIME CARD CHANGES SUNDAY

Morning Train to Run via Derry Crossing to Portland.

Unofficial announcement has just come from Portland that a new time card affecting the Dallas branch of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company will go into effect at 12:01 next Sunday morning. Under the new schedule the morning train will leave here at 6:20 as usual, but will arrive five minutes earlier, or at 7:20 p. m.

A change in the routing of the train will also be made, and beginning Sunday it will leave for Portland over the Salem, Falls City & Western railway to Derry crossing, where it will follow the Corvallis line to Portland, and will return over the same routing. Whether it will have its terminus at the Jefferson street station, as at present, or whether it will be routed to the Union station in Portland, has not yet been made public here.

The change will cut off the morning and evening service from Perrydale and other points between Dallas and Broadmead. Large petitions have been sent in lately from McCoy, Amity and other points on that line for a morning and evening train, and it is understood that the change has been made with a view to accommodating the greatest number of people possible.

Other changes in the local train service may be made under the new card, but they have not yet been given to the public.

NEW FIRE RULES ARE RIGID

Precautions Must Be Taken in Burning of Forest Slashings.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 7.—New regulations covering the burning of slashings have been issued by the State Board of Forestry, and incorporated into a press bulletin. In resolutions of the board it is pointed out that there are instances tending to show that the law has not been duly observed, and that public safety as well as private property has been endangered.

The regulations become effective August 10, and are as follows:
"Burning of log piles, stumps, or brush heaps without permit as provided for under section 7 of the Oregon Forest Fire law, is permissible only where the material to be burned is a safe distance from other inflammable material and where the ground surrounding the log piles, stumps, or brush heaps is cleared of any substance which will allow of fire spreading to adjacent wooded, brush, or slash-covered land, either the property of the parties engaged in burning or that of another."

"Adequate precautions and personal control are interpreted as meaning that all fires set without permit must be continually watched both night and day by a sufficient number of men on the ground for that purpose, and should fire escape steps must be taken at once to extinguish it."

"Burning done in violation of these regulations will subject the party or parties concerned to prosecution under the fire laws."
