DALLAS TRAIN STRIKES WAGON

Driver Is Injured and Horse Is Killed in McMinville Accident. Leo Ostrander was probably seriously injured, and one of the horses of the team he was driving was instantly killed, when the southbound Dallas passenger on the Southern Pacific crashed into his wagon at a road crossing a mile north of the McMinville station about 6 o'clock last night. A clump of trees obscured a view of the approaching train, but a long sounded before the crossing was reached. It was evident, declared eyewitnesses, that Ostrander was endeavoring to cross the track in front of the approaching train. The train was backed to the scene of the accident, and Ostrander, who was still unconscious, was placed on board and taken to the station, where a waiting ambulance was called for. The full extent of his injuries is unknown, but it is not thought that he is fatally injured.

DALLAS WANT CARRIERS

POLK COUNTY DELEGATES AFTER STATE CONVENTION IN 1912. Rural Postmen of Oregon to Meet at Eugene Next Sunday and Monday. Dallas, the bustling, active center of the peaches and prunes district--Dallas, the bustling section--Dallas, the headquarters of the Angora goat industry--Dallas, the county seat of the "Blue Ribbon County," is to be known as a convention town, if Assistant Postmaster B. P. Wells and seven of the trusty rural postmen of this county can land the 1912 annual convention of the Oregon Rural Letter Carriers' association for this city. And as they are all live ones, used to arising with the lark and hustling all the livelong day, they think they can, and their friends think they can.

Prospects Good.

The prospects for the capture are exceedingly good, they think. Polk county has a host of friends among the delegate carriers. In previous years the local boys have got in and rolled up votes for Yamhill and Benton and other counties, and now that it is their turn to ask they feel that they will have ample support in their campaign. Assistant Postmaster Wells was formerly a rural carrier himself, and although he has reformed, he is still an enthusiastic promoter of all that pertains to the welfare of the association. He is taking an active interest in the plan to bring the convention here next year and will be heard on the subject early and late. The Polk county membership in the association is considered to be the strongest in the state. J. H. Goins, of Albany, former state secretary, and now national delegate, who was in the city recently, spoke highly of the local body and said they were in the lead.

Formal Invitations.

In order to give their campaign the proper backing and to show the convention that Dallas is anxious to entertain them to the very best of her ability next fall, the delegates from here will carry with them urgent invitations from Mayor Craven, on behalf of the city; President A. B. Muir, on behalf of the Commercial club; and County Judge Ed F. Coad, representing Polk county. A telegram will also be sent to Eugene by Secretary Walter L. Toose, Jr., during the progress of the session. By next fall Dallas will be in line shape to take care of a convention. The Armory will have been finished by that time, the New Scott Hotel will be in operation and there will be no lack of accommodation.

Value of Convention.

The advantage to Dallas in obtaining the annual meeting of the carriers is inestimable. They are good advertisers, as is shown by an attractive and well-illustrated six-page folder which they have sent out to each member throughout the state, and which is of great benefit in the way of publicity for Eugene. One page is given up to "A Little Journey Through Eugene," in which succinct and interesting paragraphs about that city are presented. There is no body of men whose good will is worth more than that of the rural carriers. They are the very best of mixers; they mingle with all classes the year round, in sunshine and storm. They bring the farmer his check for produce; they bring him his magazine and his daily paper, and the package of seeds from his congressman. They bring his wife a letter from her absent son; they bring her the receipt for sponge cake that her sister makes; they bring her, and they bring her the spoils of thread that she needed to finish Alice's shirt waist. Little Johnnie depends on the carrier to bring him the fish hooks, and Sister Jennie is always out to greet him with smiles when he has a letter from that fellow in the city. So it is that up and down his life's road the carrier is warmly greeted and well liked.
