COMMERCIAL CLUB TO VISIT FALLS CITY FAIR

DALLAS BOOSTERS WILL MAKE NEIGHBORLY CALL TODAY AND VIEW EXHIBITS AT FALLS CITY

Delegation to Leave on Morning Train For Neighboring Town of Falls City, Where They Will Take in the Fair and Spend the Day in Social Intercourse and Hand Shaking.

To show its good will and neighborly feeling, to boost for Polk county and its wonderful resources, and to see and enjoy the Falls City fair, which closes tonight, a large delegation of the Dallas Commercial club, and many of the citizens of this place, are to leave this morning for a day's visit in the beautiful mountain city to the westward, where the air is pungent with the odor of the fir and the soil is rich in the products required by man. The matter was decided upon at the regular meeting of the club Wednesday night, and an enthusiastic and jolly lot of Dallasians, every one bearing a badge with the word "Dallas" imprinted thereon, will make the trip today.

Urges New Station.
Among other subjects under consideration at the meeting, was the suggestion of U. S. Grant, that some steps should be taken toward obtaining a more adequate railroad station for this city. The present structure was entirely too small for the commercial needs of the place, and a larger and more modern building, in keeping with the development of the town, should be erected.

Edwin Jacobson was appointed to go to the state fair grounds at Salem and get the exhibit of grains and grasses sent over by Polk county this fall. It was considered worthy of preservation and will be brought back and stored for future use.

WETTEST SEPTEMBER IN PAST FIFTEEN YEARS

Precipitation More Than Double Average Recorded for that Period.

According to the report just made by Weather Observer F. M. French of the local station, the rainfall at Albany for September 1911 is without precedent for 15 years and is more than double the average precipitation for the month of September during the past decade and a half.

The report for the month just closed shows a rainfall of four and twenty-three one-hundredths inches. The heaviest precipitation for any previous September for the 15 years was in 1898 when the rainfall was 3.05. The lowest precipitation for September was in 1908, which was .40.—Albany Herald.
