The gross receipts of the first game in the world's championship series were \$77,350, paid by 38,281 enthusiasts, many of whom parted from \$10 hard cash or more for single seats which they bought of speculators. The New York and Athletic players divided \$41,000 among themselves, and the real "fans" will not be inclined to say that it was too much. Their opinions as to the actions of the speculators who raised the price of seats to prohibitive figures and kept many devotees of the game from attending are quite different. The crowd in the Giants' stadium, a part of which is shown in the picture, was the greatest that ever watched an athletic event in America.
