CAMPAIGN SUCCESSFUL

Many Houses to Be Wired as Result of Oregon Power Company's Reduced Rates.

In consequence of the reduced rates introduced by Local Manager J. L. White, of the Oregon Power Company, in his campaign for new business in Dallas, Monmouth and Independence, electric light service over 50 houses in the three places are under contract to be wired. The quick response to the three special propositions made by him show growing appreciation of the great range of adaptability of electric service in the home.

At the beginning of the campaign, 75 per cent of the families in Dallas were using electric light, and the only reason that more of them were not using it was because their houses were not wired. It was in order to accommodate the remaining number that the chance was given to have them wired at actual cost for a period of 30 days.

Another big hop deal was consummated last Saturday when H. Lalaberty sold his lot of 76 bales to a Salem buyer, receiving 42½ cents per pound. This is said to be the best price received for hops in this vicinity for a number of years. Household Hints.

Keep a few pieces of camphor gum in your linen closet. It will aid in keeping the linen white.
