"That's garlic," replied his sister. Philadelphia Times.

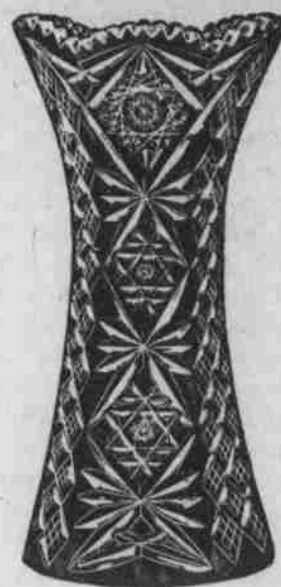
A Nice Story.
