OREGON POWER COMPANY AWARDED NEW CONTRACT

Will Supply Electric Current For
Monmouth Street Lights Dur-
ing Next Five Years.

At a meeting of the city council
of Monmouth held last Tuesday night
Local Manager J. L. White, of the
Oregon Power company, was awarded
the contract for supplying the cur-
rent for the system of incandescent
electric lights throughout that town
for the ensuing five years. The prop-
osition to install arc lamps has been
under consideration, but final deci-
sion has been postponed until some
later date.

The contract with the Oregon Pow-
er company allows the city to re-
place the incandescents with arc
lamps any time that is desired.

The matter of awarding the con-
tract for the installation of a mu-
nicipal water system was deferred un-
til the next meeting of the council,
to be held December 12.
