ORCHARD BRINGS BIG PRICE

Portland Parties Pay \$30,000 For Dundee Tract.

The sale is reported of the W. G. Sanderson prune orchard of 100 acres, on the hills southwest of Dundee for \$30,000, the purchasers being J. C. Castello and Phillip Philian, of Portland.

Several years ago this land was bought from the Grames heirs by Seth A. Mills and his brother, Dr. A. Mills, now of Corvallis, both of whom built houses on the land and lived there for several years. They set most of the land to Italian prunes and the orchards are now reputed to rank with the best in the country.

Mr. Sanderson is said to have put a good many improvements on the land but the increase in price over what he paid for it shows a handsome profit.—Newberg Graphic.

Beaver Boys Do Gallery Shooting in College Armory.

Corvallis, Dec. 26.—Galeley shooting practice by the cadets under the new commandant, Lieutenant Miller, at the Oregon Agricultural College. FANCY COOKING COURSE TO BE GIVEN BY COLLEGE

Students at Corvallis Have Chance to Learn All Sorts of Domestic Accomplishments.

Corvallis, Dec. 26.—Miss A. B. Milan of the domestic science department of the Oregon Agricultural College has just announced a new course in fancy cooking in addition to the work previously announced for the short course.

The new course, which will be given Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 2 to 4, will cover many subjects. The domestic science department is to give instructions in millinery, in which the short course students learn to design, make and trim their own Parisian creations.

A course in food preparation, the principles of laundering, home management, plain sewing and in dress-making are also to be given this year, January 3 to February 3.

CURTAIN COLLEGE DRAMATICS

O. A. C. Faculty Makes New Rulings Cutting Number of Plays.

Corvallis, Dec. 26.—The number of plays which may be produced at the Oregon Agricultural College by the students has just been curtailed to three a year hereafter, by special ruling of the faculty entertainment committee. The new rules also provide that no student below 80 in his studies may take part in public dramatics. This year plays may be presented by the seniors, the juniors, the dramatic club, and jointly by the Zetagathians and Utopians. Next year, however, but three plays may be given, one by the seniors and two by the dramatic club.
