## Chinese War Poster Adopted By San Francisco Liberals



CHINESE patriots in San Francisco are very much up to date. They have issued a revolutionary poster, of which copies are for sale in most of the Chinese shops. The proceeds are devoted to the financing of the rebellion. The portrait is that of Li Yuen Hong, the chief military commander of the insurgents. The flags at either side are the banners of the provisional government after the design which has been adopted by the Young China association, many of whose members in America wish to see a republic established in China. The pictures below the portrait (which, of course, are not a part of the poster) are those of the chiefs of naval and military affairs at Peking. The names from left to right are: Ying Chung, president of the war ministry, late commander in chief; Tsai Pu, second son of Prince Ching; Prince Tsai Hsuen, head of naval affairs; Prince Tsai Jin, Prince Tsai Tiao, late military councillor (the last three uncles of the emperor); Duke Ling, Prince Pu and Tan Heo Hegg, subpresident of the navy.

HOW TO COOK IN CAMP  
Special Course For Men at Agricultural College Attracts Many.

Corvallis, Or., Jan. 16.—Camp cooking is the substance of a new course "for men only" at the Oregon Agricultural college short course, which is attracting many men, a number being members of the faculty. Twice a week they meet in the domestic science laboratories, and Miss Eva B. Milan and her assistant Miss Bertha Edwards teach them such simple forms of domestic science as may be applied to the bonfires of camp and trail. The commandant of the regimental corps of cadets, the dean of the school of commerce, the recorder of the faculties, and teachers from the art and public speaking departments are among those enrolled.

Committeeman Confers With Hillis on Political Situation.

Washington, Jan. 16.—Ralph E. Williams, Republican National committeeman for Oregon, after a conference Thursday with Mr. Hillis, private secretary of the President, left for Chicago to attend a meeting of the sub-committee, which is to make arrangements for representation in the National convention. At the White House conference Mr. Williams gave Hillis the benefit of such political information as came his way on his recent visit to New York. He was not disposed to talk for publication regarding what took place at the White House today.

Mr. Williams will return to Washington in about a week for a further conference with the President and Mr. Hillis and then will leave for Oregon by the Southern route. Mrs. Williams accompanied him to Chicago.

## FARM LIFE LURES HIM

Dallas Man Buys Interest in Six Hundred Acre Hop and Dairy Ranch on Salt Creek.

A sale of farm land in the vicinity of Salt Creek, whereby Edwin Jacobson, of this city, and Frank Pawk became the owners of a 600 acre tract of hop, fruit and dairy land, is announced. The purchase price is, not made public, but it is understood to be in excess of \$20,000. Jacobson and Pawk have each been the owners of a 180 acre farm there, and the purchase of an additional 240 acres from Peter Schultz enlarges their holdings to the total given.

Near Dallas.  
The land is situated three and a half miles from Dallas and is considered one of the choice farms of the county. Seventy-four acres are in hops, from which the new owners expect to make at \$12,000 this year. Seven acres are in Spitzenberg apples, and over a hundred acres are under cultivation. The ranch is well equipped with modern farm houses and barns and has besides three large hop houses.

Mr. Jacobson will move to Salt Creek early in the spring and will spend the summer there while enjoying the active life of a farmer.
