TO HELP SCHOOL FAIRS

Corvallis College Appropriates Thousands to Promote Interest in Contests Throughout State.

Corvallis, Jan. 16.—Prizes totaling thousands of dollars have already been offered to the children of Oregon for industrial exhibits at the state and county fairs and school fairs. State Superintendent of Schools Alderman, cooperating with the county superintendents, the state fair association, the Portland Commercial club, the Oregon Development league, the State Bankers' association, and the extension division of the Oregon Agricultural college, will organize and conduct contests in corn growing, poultry raising, manual training, domestic science, potato growing, and other industrial work, and every child in the state will have opportunity to compete for the prizes.

The State Fair association has agreed to furnish \$1400 in cash prizes for school exhibits, and promises of other prizes amounting to \$2000 have also been made, while other interests which will doubtless contribute have not yet been approached. The commercial clubs all over the state will push the work, and a committee on agricultural education from the State Bankers' association has agreed to raise at least \$1800 to assist in the work.

Some 30 different branches of the industry will be included in the contests, and those entering will be required to keep for the college accurate and complete records of their work from the beginning. Thus a vast amount of valuable data will be secured. One county superintendent states that there will be at least 4000 children exhibiting from his county alone.

PTOMAIN POISONING FATAL

Former Falls City Little Girl Dies at Newport Home.

Newport, Or., Jan. 16.—Inez Lavelle, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Pye, died at the home of the family at Agate Beach, Friday evening, January 5, from ptomaine poisoning, aged 3 years, three months and three days. The little one had eaten a couple of decayed bananas about a week previous, which it is believed, caused the fatal illness. The funeral was conducted from the Copeland undertaking parlors Sunday afternoon, Rev. C. T. Hurd, officiating, and the burial took place in the Newport cemetery. The bereaved parents recently came here from Falls City.

STATE TAXES BOUND UPWARD

Levy For Year Exceeds Total for 1906, 1907 and 1908.

Salem, Or., Jan. 16.—The state taxes to be collected for 1912 amount to more than the taxes collected altogether in 1906, 1907 and 1908. The taxes for 1912 total \$3,063,815, while in the three years mentioned the sum was \$2,800,000.

The taxes to be collected for 1912 are more than the combined taxes for 1910 and 1911, when they totaled \$2,914,016 for the two years.

Line to Tap Burned Area.

Falls City, Or., Jan. 12.—The Falls City Lumber company has surveyors seeking a route for a railroad into the Cobb & Mitchell timber belt in the Siletz Basin. The main object for building such a railroad is the securing of 150,000,000 feet of burned timber for which the company has contracted. Numerous surveys have been made, but none was satisfactory.

Enlarging Mission.

The members of the Apostolic Faith congregation are having alterations made to the building which they occupy on Main street next to Guy Brothers hardware store. The room used for their meetings is to be more than twice as large as the one in use.
