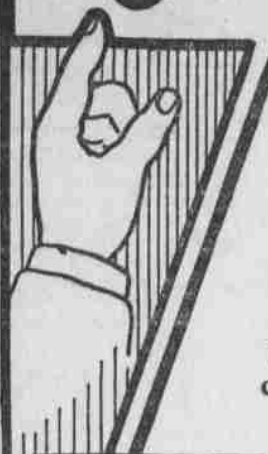

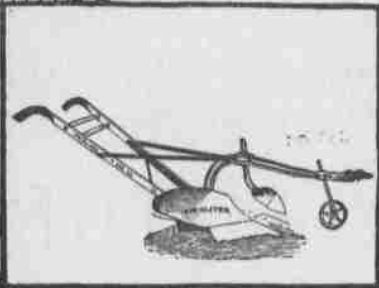

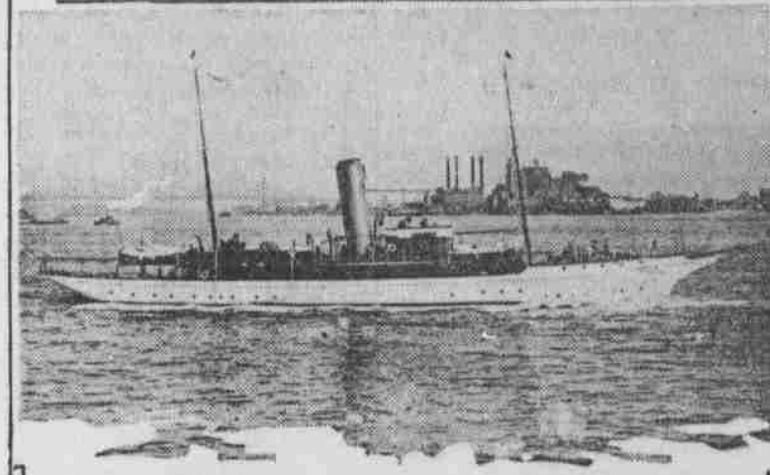

How Postal Savings Banks Grow.

The popularity and success of the United States postoffice savings banks are evidenced by the chain of postal savings banks which are being opened in cities and towns all over the country just as fast as arrangements can be made to handle deposits.

Some idea of the post-office savings bank as an institution may be gathered from the statistics of the British postal savings bank, organized fifty years ago. The staff, which originally consisted of twenty men, now has 3,263 members, 1,437 men and 1,826 women. At first the number of savings banks in postoffice cities and towns was limited to 300. Today there are 15,300 of these savings banks, with 8,000,000 depositors, whose total deposits—that is, money still on deposit and without counting the withdrawals—has now reached the enormous sum of \$845,000,000.

The San Jose scale is a pest that requires a stronger spray than tender growing foliage will stand. For this reason the treatment should be made between the time the leaves fall in autumn and the time they start in the spring. If the job is delayed until spring the spraying will also play amash with the green aphids, which is a troublesome pest in many sections.
