

AGED RESIDENT PASSES

William W. Miller, Aged Over 81 Years, Had Lived in Dallas Since Crossing Plains in 1866.

William W. Miller passed away at his home in this city, Saturday, January 27, at the age of 81 years and 27 days. The funeral was conducted by Rev. Leon L. Meyers at the Church of Christ, Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and the remains laid away in the Odd Fellows cemetery. He is survived by his wife, three children, and 11 grandchildren. The children are all residents of Dallas and are: Chloe, wife of H. S. Butz; Lucretia, wife of J. F. Holman; and William P. Miller.

Mr. Miller was born near Nauvoo, Illinois, December 31, 1831. When he was fourteen, the family removed to Iowa, and were among the first settlers west of Fort Des Moines. In 1857 he married Miss Lydia Leaming, who was born in Indiana and reared in Iowa.

Crossed Plains.
In 1866, with his wife and only child, he crossed the plains to Oregon, coming as captain of a train of 20 wagons. They started May 1 and reached Dallas, their destination, in safety, August 18. They were greatly annoyed by the Indians on this journey but no serious mishap befell them.

He purchased a sawmill in the Pedee country and ran it and another mill several years. He sold out and returned East in 1869, and in 1871 again came to Oregon, having made three trips across the plains and each time with horses. He rented land near Dallas for eight years and in 1881 purchased 252 acres adjoining Dallas on the east and here he has since resided.

Active Christian.
Mr. Miller joined the Christian church in 1858 at Adel, Iowa, transferring his letter to Dallas in 1865 where he has since been an earnest christian worker holding many positions of trust, and was noted for his tolerance of other beliefs.

In 1881 he gave each of his three children 50 acres of land and had the pleasure of having them near him during his declining years.

Mr. Miller was a Democrat in his younger years, but joined the Prohibition party when it was first formed and has ever since been an enthusiastic supporter of it. His life was characterized by honesty and industry, and he enjoyed the good will and esteem of all who knew him.
