DALLAS SEES START OF STATE MOVEMENT

(Continued from Page One.)

Fleischner & Meyer company, Portland, manufacturers of men and women's clothing, confined his remarks for the most part to the difficulties encountered in selling goods to Oregon dealers in competition with Eastern made products. He had no fault to find with Dallas dealers, he said, but, in many cases, while by figures and price quotations, he could show the dealer that he could sell them as good goods at prices equally as low as Eastern manufacturers, he found a disposition to discriminate in favor of the latter output. Since the dealers themselves would not educate the people in the buy at home idea, the Oregon Manufacturers' association had undertaken to do so, and create a demand for Oregon products which would result in requiring dealers to handle them and thereby every dollar's worth of capital invested in manufacturing enterprises would be benefitted. "Every dollar you spend for Oregon made goods," said Mr. Hoag, "helps some Oregon man or woman to make a living in this state and every dollar you spend for Eastern made goods takes just that much away from some resident of your own state. Oregon manufacturers buy your raw material. They offer you a remunerative market near by and in return ask you to buy their manufactured materials. How can you expect them to buy of you unless you do not return the favor? Oregon manufacturers are not, however, asking you to buy goods simply because they bear a "Made in Oregon" tag, but rather because they offer you as good materials and at as reasonable a price as the Eastern man."

Urges Consistency.
A. Huckestein, of Salem, made the subject of his remarks the need of consistency among business men. The buy at home idea was for their benefit, and they should not only talk it on all occasions, but they should practice it also. There should be no rivalry between business interests except that of legitimate competition. Towns and cities must work together. Time was when every business man in the valley cities believed, that the only way was to "paddle his own canoe" and give no heed to the welfare of anybody else. That policy had resulted in retarding the development of this state, and Oregon for many years had been merely a flag station between Washington and California. Its hustling neighbors on the North and South. Merchants were afraid of competition and discouraged all new institutions until they found that every new man who came and made his home among them added just that much to the prosperity of the community and the property of all was increased. "The most prosperous time in Dallas," declared Mr. Huckestein, "is in the fall when the farmer markets his crops, but the Oregon Manufacturers' association wants to make every month of the 12 equally as prosperous and, if this Made in Oregon slogan and the buy at home movement receives the encouragement it is entitled to, that end will be accomplished. What Dallas needs is new industries and new factories in order that she will not have to depend alone upon the farmer for her prosperity and the farmer will also be benefitted. There is no need to give large bonuses for such institutions, the better way is to give them encouragement by purchasing their output in preference to any other, and the factories will come of their own accord. Get back of your factories and thus build up your city."

Home Goods Better.
In closing the meeting Col. Hofer declared that it was just as easy to ask for Oregon made products as for the Eastern brands. "Do not accept any other," advised Col. Hofer, "and remember that the home manufacturer makes a better article than the foreign man, because he does not have to pay transportation charges upon raw materials for a long distance, and you do not have to pay freight charges upon the manufactured article."

On behalf of the Oregon Manufacturers' association Col. Hofer thanked the Dallas people for attendance and declared that this, the first meeting for the organization of the "Oregon First Consumers' League" had been an auspicious one and pointed to still greater successes in the statewide movement.
