ASKS DIVORCE FOR NON SUPPORT

CORA E. McALLISTER BRINGS SUIT IN DEPARTMENT NO. 2.

Her Husband, E. S. McAllister, Said to Have Deserted Her Here—Notes of Other Cases Pending.

Another divorce suit has been filed in Department No. 2 of circuit court for Polk county. The plaintiff is Cora E. McAllister who seeks separation from her husband, E. S. McAllister, on the grounds of lack of support and desertion. According to her complaint, she has been a resident of Dallas for 20 years and was married to the defendant in this city August 19, 1906, and she avers that at no time since then has he contributed to her support, and further that he deserted her December 1, 1910. The defendant is supposed to be near Marblemount, Skagit county, Washington. There are no children. Mrs. McAllister asks right also to resume her former name, J. H. Flower, of Falls City, is her attorney.

Demurrer Filed. Ernest Ziesch, through his attorney, Oscar Hayter, has filed in Department No. 1, a demurrer to the complaint of Eilers' Piano House of Portland, in which the latter alleged that Ziesch had purchased a piano of them at an agreed price of \$325, \$275 of which was unpaid and for which suit was brought recently. The defendant demurs on the ground that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action.

Oscar Hayter as attorney for the defendant has filed an appeal in Department No. 1, from Justice Hardy Holman's court in the case of Joseph Sharp versus Loyd Jones, wherein Sharp was recently given a verdict of \$10, together with costs and disbursements, in an action brought to recover \$129.75 claimed to be due on account.

PRIZE LIST TO BE ISSUED

Boys and Girls to Compete in State Contest. Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 13.—An edition of 50,000 copies of the 32 page bulletin on industrial contests for Oregon boys and girls will be issued shortly from the Oregon Agricultural college printing plant, and one will be sent to every child in the state who is eligible to the contests. A prize list, not yet completed, already holds five prizes for each class in all of the various competitions.

The first prizes include Shetland ponies, Jersey and Holstein calves, Southdown, Shropshire, Cotswold and Lincoln sheep, Poland China, Berkshire and Duroc Jersey pigs, Scotch collies, and chickens of various breeds, as well as other valuable awards. The second prize in each class is \$6, the third \$5, the fourth \$4, and the fifth \$2.
